

approaching struggle in which Prussia, in the first instance, must be almost single, without painful apprehensions. The Monitor makes a parade of the conscripts marching to join the army, and 300,000 men are said to be ready to march into Germany.

The departure of Bonaparte from Paris for the army, seems to determine what the German accounts had led to doubt. The King of Prussia, it was supposed, would leave Berlin for the army on the 20th, if the dispatches from M. Knabeislof, at Paris, were not satisfactory. Bonaparte joining the army shows that he did not consider them such as were likely to secure peace without the intimidation of his presence at the head of the army. The Duke of Brunsvick established his headquarters at Halle on the 13th. The King was expected there, but it is probable that the headquarters would be advanced towards the enemy before the 20th.

The Monitor notices an important measure of the Ottoman Porte. The Princes of Moldavia and Wallachia, who are considered as devoted to Russia, have been deposed. We doubt, however, whether the order will be executed. The change proposed evidently originates in the French interest at Constantinople. We can, however, lay before our readers accounts received direct from Constantinople, by the Mails of yesterday, on which they may place a reliance, which it would be folly to give to any coming through a French channel.

When the new French Ambassador arrived at Constantinople on the 10th of August last, reports were circulated that the result of his visit would be unfavorable to the interests of G. Britain; and nothing less than immediate declaration of war against this country was expected. The Porte has, however, pursued a different line of conduct, and assured the British Merchants that their fears of a rupture were groundless.

WEYMAR September 11.
The Whole army of Silesia, commanded by the Prince of Hohenzollern, and consisting of about 50,000 men, crossed the Elbe to-day near Dresden. If we may believe general reports, 150,000 Russians are entering Silesia as a corps de reserve. Saxony, according to some, will furnish 20,000 and according to others 30,000 men who will assist in occupying Thuringia.

The French are concentrating themselves in force near Bayreuth and Cobourg where according to all appearance, the first blow will be struck, unless it should be in the environs of Munster.

Our most Serene Duke yesterday received orders for his departure; he commands in chief a corps of the Prussian Army.

Augsburg, September 11.
After the arrival of a Courier from Paris, Marshal Lefevre set out from this city, at eleven at night, to go by Nordlingen to Donkeisbuhl. His departure has given strength to the report that war is determined on between France and Prussia. We are assured that the departure of the French troops from Germany is deferred for an indefinite time, and that it will not take place till the differences shall be terminated which at present subsists between France and Prussia, and France and Russia.

BANKS OF THE MAINE, Sept. 13.
All the General Officers and Great Officers of State who were at Paris, were convoked by the Emperor Napoleon on the 8th of this month, at St. Cloud, when it is said that his Majesty held a Council of War, the political situation of Europe requiring measures of precaution.

NORFOLK November 20.

Captain Sherman, arrived here from Malaga, informs, that early in September, as the U.S. schr. Enterprize, capt. Foster passed Algeiras, he was fired upon and attacked by seven Spanish gunboats, at which he bore down on them until within half without returning their fire; but on finding that they still continued firing, notwithstanding his colors were hoisted, he poured into the Dons a few broadsides, which made them lurk into their skulking holes.

Our correspondent at Nassau has furnished us with the Royal Gazette from the 17th Oct. to the 4th inst from which we have made the following and several marine extracts.

The late disastrous gales having destroyed the crops of provisions planted on the cut islands, as well as those which the planters had in their barns, a very considerable quantity of corn will be immediately wanted. At present there is not a bushel of that article for sale in the whole colony; and in case some cargoes of it do not arrive from the American States, very serious apprehensions may be entertained.

The vessels belonging to this port which were sent to bring our supplies from the Continent, are either lost, or so much damaged as to be irreparable for a considerable time to come—we cannot therefore depend upon our own exertions in this respect, because we have none left within our power at present.

We can further venture to say, that while the scarcity of provisions continues, American vessels which bring corn will also be permitted to import salted provisions.

Extract of a letter from Liverpool, to a gentleman in Philadelphia, dated Sept. 30.

"The demand for Manufactured goods, in consequence of the capture of Buenos Ayres, is a great beyond belief, particularly in the woollen line—not a Cropper (knifer) in all the manufacturing towns in Great Britain is unemployed."

By the ship Liberty, captain Chew, arrived at New-York from Liverpool, we have received Liverpool to the THIRD and London Papers to the FIRST OF OCTOBER, and Paris accounts to the 27th of September. The aspect of Europe at the date of these advices, and they are the latest, was entirely warlike.—The Emperor Napoleon, accompanied by the Empress, and attended by the minister Talleyrand (now Prince of Benevento) had left Paris, taking the road for Mentz. The Prussian, Saxon, and Hessian armies, were marching to a general rendezvous. The Russian troops, amounting to 150,000 men, were marching to Westphalia. The French forces were assembling at different points on the frontiers of Germany. No doubt was entertained of immediate hostilities—and although Lord Lauderdale had not returned to London, it was presumed that the object of his mission had ceased, as both the Emperor and the minister of foreign relations, had left Paris.

The British Parliament was prorogued to the 16th of October.—An order of the King in Council had been issued to raise the blockade of the Prussian ports—the differences between England and Prussia had been adjusted—and Baron Jacob, late Prussian minister to the Court of St. James, was daily expected in London. A large reinforcement of British troops had sailed for Buenos Ayres—of which Gen. Beresford was appointed Governor, with a salary of 10,000 pounds sterling per annum.

The Emperor of Russia is said to have taken possession of Prussia Proper, which was to be held as a pledge for the king's observance of his engagements with the allies.

The Swedish army, 50,000 strong, were entering Hanover, to cooperate with Prussia.

COMMERCIAL.
The American trade with the West-India Colonies has heretofore been carried on under the restrictions of the Proclamations of the different Governors, for it is the consequence:—We now read, that an Act of Parliament has been passed, taking the power from the Governors, and placing it in the King in Council—who have issued an order, for permitting the trade, for twelve months from the 1st of September, 1806, to persons whose establishments are established; and counting the articles to be exported, Lumber of all sorts, and the several kinds of Pulse, Grain, Flour and Fish, under the denomination of provisions. There appears a material difference between the Proclamations above referred to, and the Orders of the King in Council; which if we are correct in our construction of them, is of importance to those concerned in the trade:—The Proclamations above pointed out the different articles which were admissible, and declared that vessels bringing any others than such, would be seized; and that Lumber and Molasses would only be permitted to be taken in return.—The productions admitted were such as we have mentioned above:—But the Orders of the King, lay, "Staves, Lumber, and all sorts of Provisions, (excepting Beef, Pork and Butter) are permitted." We think there are several kinds of "Provisions" which may be taken in addition to the usual ones, not to be ranked with the exceptions; and for returns we are allowed to bring the productions of the colony, except cocoa, coffee, sugar, cotton and indigo. We may safely therefore, add to the usual ones, several others—such as Lard, Dried Woads, Hides, &c. and the Orders differ from the Proclamations in having no penalty attached to them. The commercial regulations for the West-India are extended to the new-conquered colony of Buenos Ayres.

Market.—At Trinidad, 16th October, American provisions of every kind extremely scarce; flour 24 dollars, and not a barrel for sale. 14th 8 dollars, rice 10, beet and pork none. Lumber of every description scarce and dear.

At Charleston, 25th ult. Upland Cotton was at 22 cents, Sea-Island No. 2 to 30—Beef, cargo No. 1, 12 dollars; No. 2, 10 dollars.—Northern Pork, 12.
