Late and Important News. NEW-YORK, November 27. By the ship Pallas, captain Brown, who left Amsterdam on the 11th of October, the editor of the MERCANTILE ADVERTISER has received Dutch papers to the 9th. They are principally occupied with the movements of those mighty masses of men, who it seems are embodying for the purpose of relighting the flames of war upon the continent of Europe.—To this important subject our translations from these papers are confined to-day. Lord Lauderdale, at the date of our latest advices from France, was indisposed at the seat of General Junot, the governor of Paris. We learn that a new camp, to be called the camp of Auferlitz, was forming at Zief. Four Russian ships of the line and 4 frigates, bound for the Mediterranean anchored at Copenhagen on the 23d September. The army of Marshal Soult was collecting in the environs of Plattenhofen and Ingolstadt; that of Marshal Bernadotte between Nuremberg and Furth; both armies are to be under the command of Bernadotte, and are estimated at 65,000 men. Davout's army of 30,000 were marching to Aufspach as a reinforcement. The corps of Lefebvre (formerly Mortier's) consisting of 20,000, were drawing near to Schweinfurt, and that of Marshal Ney was on its march. All the troops which were posted on the Warre are to reinforce the army of Marshal Augereau. Concerning the movements of Prussia it is stated, in letters from Berlin, of the 30th of September, that no doubt existed there of the speedy commencement of hostilities. In a declaration of France, Prussia is said to have intimated that Bonaparte should withdraw his troops from Germany, that he should not intermeddle in the affairs of the north, and that he should accede to measures for restoring a continental peace. The army of Saxony consists of 120,000 men. Baron Jacob, formerly the Prussian envoy to Great Britain, left Hamburg for London on the 2d of October. The last of September the Prussian royal household was removed from Naumburg to Weissen. The corps of Gen. Kalkreuth which faced the Swedes in Swedish Pomerania, has also joined that army; whose arms of Saxony consists of 150,000 men. On the 2d of October Baron Jacob, the former Prussian envoy to Great Britain, left Hamburg for London. The French papers mention that 3000 men are immediately expected at Coblenz, to assume a military position round that city. The first detachment of the army of Gen. Oudinot has arrived at Strasburg by the way of the Rhine. There are continual embarkations of troops on the Rhine, which arrive from France to join the Grand Army, whilst at her corps go by water to the same destination. The Prussian, Russian, and French armies are all in motion. The king of Holland, and suit arrived at Driebergen, the 5th of October, where he reviewed several regiments, the next morning he proceeded to Wezel. Translated for the Mercantile Advertiser from Dutch papers to the 5th Oct. Paris, Oct. 1 His majesty the Emperor arrived at Verdun on the 26th September, and reached Metz on the 28th, accompanied by Prince Borgeuse, marshals Keilmann, Duroc, Augereau, Moncey, Bessiers, and a number of others, with 10,000 men. Hague Oct. 5.—Letters from Niamegum state that several regiments of French and Dutch troops have passed through that city, and that the army in the neighbourhood will consist of 100,000 men, in two divisions, one of them to be commanded by General Michaud, whose head quarters are at Diersfordt; the other, consisting of the king's guard, horse artillery, &c. by General Demonceau. This morning early the king left this place for the army. [He arrived on the same day at Driebergen, reviewed several regiments, and proceeded the next morning to Wingezel.] Antwerp, Oct. 9.—French papers mention that 3,000 men are immediately expected at Coblenz, where they are immediately to assume a military position round that city. The first detachment of the army of Gen. Oudinot, has arrived at Strasburg by the way of the Rhine. There are continual embarkations of troops on the Rhine, which are constantly arriving from France, to join the grand army, whilst other corps go by water to the same destination. Pozen (Poland) Sep. 23.—Prussian troops are continually passing through this place for Germany. Banks of the Nieme, Sept. 24.—The Servians and the Turks had a most desperate battle on the 29th and 30th of August.—The former were surrounded by 15,000 Turks during the action, but being reinforced by 7000 men, the tide of victory turned in their favor, and they defeated the Turks with great slaughter, leaving upwards of 4000 dead on the field. They also took 500 horses, a number of mules, ammunition, cannon, and many prisoners. Berlin, Sept. 27.—Laforest, the French ambassador here, has not yet received his passports, though he has discharged most of his servants as a measure preparatory to quitting this city. It is however still hoped that a rupture will be prevented. Frankfurt, September 28. The Prussian army now in motion is posted in several divisions from East Friesland to the borders of Bohemia, and is said to consist of 250,000 men, exclusive of a powerful militia General Blucher commands the right wing, which can be immediately supported by general Ruchel. The Duke of Brunswick commands the centre, and Prince Hohenlohe the left wing. Besides these officers, there are the Prince of Hesse, Marshal Mollendorf, 7 general's and 25 lieutenant general's of cavalry, 100 major-general's, 183 colonels, 62 lieutenant colonels, and 666 majors. The annual expenses of this army will be from 22 to 24 millions, which is nearly two-thirds of the whole income of the Prussian government. The king's life guard commenced their march from Potsdam on the 31st of August. Some old generals have retired on a pension.

The Prince of Hohenlohe has demanded from the court of Dresden permission to march the Prussian army through that country, which is to be replaced by an army of Russians. Report says that General Blucher has marched from Waldeck into Hesse. The arrival of Augereau is waited for with impatience. He is to remove his head quarters from Grossen to Weizlaer. After to-morrow 12,000 men are expected at Metz, and were also to march to Weizlaer. The park of heavy artillery of Uta will be stationed in our environs and those of Darmstadt. Lige, September 28.—The Prussian corps of reserve under Prince Eugene of Wirtemberg, formerly posted at Kustrin, marches along de Spreer towards the Saxon frontier, to be nearer the principal Prussian army. Brauns, Sept. 16. The corps of Gen. Soult at this place is augmented to 35,000 men. Dresden, Sept. 23. The French ambassador Correns, Durand, has demanded his passports. The number of Prussian troops posted several days past in the mountains near this city, amount to 60,000 men—the head quarters which was here is now removed to Fribourg, because the troops are advancing. The whole Saxon army is in motion, will immediately march, except five battalions and two regiments of cavalry that remain behind. The Saxon army is estimated at 25,000 men. It is reported, that the King of Prussia, and the Dukes of Brunswick and Saxon Weimer are expected here.

American, AND Commercial Daily Advertiser. MONDAY, DECEMBER 1, 1866. The River Exchange, G. L. of this port, has been captured and carried into Larraoc. Colonel Aaron Burr late Vice President of the United States, is expected at Washington, in a day or two. [Washington Federalist.] The election of member of congress for the ensuing session in the room of Dr. L. J. who goes to the state legislature, terminated, as we yesterday stated, in the election of Dr. John Porter. Aurora. One of the gentlemen who arrived here in the ship Governor Gilman informs us, that previous to his departure, he read in an Amsterdam paper of the 6th of October an account of the capture of four French frigates by a squadron under the command of Commodore Sir Donald Hood after a severe action. The French squadron consisted of five frigates, (one of which escaped) bound from France for the West-Indies, with coops and military companies on board. The ships for India were gone down upon them, and before they discovered the mistake, were within reach of the guns of the British squadron. Commodore Hood lost an arm in the action. [N. Y. pap.] [The intelligence announced in the above paragraph, corroborates the accounts brought by Captain Stungers, arrived at Philadelphia published in Saturday's American.] If the following assertion is a fact, it is new to us. On the 11th of May last, the French councillor of state Joubert, in a speech to the legislative body, speaking of Napoleon, said—"Princes, faithful to their true interests, seconded by their commitment in the grand movements impressed by the emperor.—How will have they inspired the inhabitants of the Brazils, [in South America!] Struck with the renown of the great man, they sent deputies to the prince regent of Portugal, for the purpose of requesting him to neglect nothing to preserve the benevolence (fraternalship) of Napoleon; and this remarkable mission was discharged in presence of all the court, the foreign ambassadors, and most of the English ambassador, who burst out with rage at it." [Boston Centinel.] [The Bourbons of Spain, are destined to reign with "Castile and Leon" for the "new world" which Columbus gave them; and to say over the ancient realms of Montezuma. The Portuguese monarchy is also destined to be transferred to the new world, and Brazil to be its realm.—Aurora.] If the rumors respecting Mr. Burr's incendiary proceedings in the western country should prove to be well founded, we wish the Federalists not to make any effronter use of it. "Least said, soonest mended." Who voted for Burr thirty-six times as president? [Boston Chronicle.] Gen. Eaton is now on a visit in this town. We understand, he confirms the report of col Burr's having made some overtures to him on the subject of founding a new empire in the southern and western parts of this country. As this subject involves matters of much interest and curiosity, it is hoped the general will furnish the public with some of the particulars connected with this extraordinary transaction. [Boston Gazette.] BANKING SYSTEM.—The legislature of Vermont, have put an end to private banking speculations, by establishing a state bank, with two branches, one of which is to be established at Woodstock, and the other at Middlebury. [ibid.] We understand that the Hon. Brockholst Livingston is appointed an associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, in the place of the Hon. William Patterson, deceased. N. Y. pap.
