AN ORDINANCE

Making appropriations for the year one thousand eight hundred and seven. Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That there be appropriated to the deepening & preserving the harbor of Baltimore, to be paid out of any money arising from the duty on tonnage of vessels and auctioneers, the sum of six thousand dollars: For cleansing the streets, a sum not exceeding three thousand five hundred dollars: For removing nuisances, a sum not exceeding one thousand five hundred dollars: For the health officer, his salary, one thousand dollars: For the health department, a sum not exceeding fifteen hundred dollars: For the commissioners of health, each four hundred dollars, and one hundred dollars for their secretary: For printing and incidental expenses, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars: For repairing the paved streets, lanes and alleys, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars: For paving cross-streets, lanes and alleys, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars: For watching and lighting the city, a sum not exceeding thirteen thousand dollars: For altering and widening footways, a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars: To the clerk of the centre market, in addition to his salary, the sum of one hundred dollars; to the clerk of Fell's Point market, seventy-five dollars; & to the clerk of the Hanover market, forty dollars: For oiling, winding and regulating the clock in the steeple of the German reformed Church, the sum of seventy-five dollars: For securing and repairing Billingsgate-street, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars: For extending the fish market one hundred and eleven feet from the west end thereof to the distance of sixty feet from the west side of Jones's Falls, a sum not exceeding two thousand two hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of Joseph Townsend, Michael Dillender and Baltzer Schaeffer, with the approbation of the mayor: For filling in New Church street, between Calvert and North streets, a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners: For repairing Hanover market, a sum not exceeding two hundred and thirty dollars, to be expended under the direction of Jacob Small and William Waterhouse: To pay Joshua Reynolds a balance due him for paving cross-roads, the sum of three hundred and nine dollars and fifty-eight cents: To the Union, Friendship, Mechanical, Deptford, Liberty, Federal, Vigilant, Columbia and Franklin fire-companies, to aid in keeping their fire engines in good order and to defray other expenses, (an account of which shall be returned to the register on or before the first day of Feb. next,) a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars each, to be drawn for by the presidents of said companies from time to time, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purposes aforesaid: To discharge a balance due Joshua Ebnias, the sum of fifty dollars: For building footbridges on each side of the stone-bridge in Wilkes-street, at the intersection of Harford-street, a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, to be expended under the direction of George Hussey and Frederick Schaeffer: To William Patterson, the sum of one hundred and eight dollars and seventy-five cents, due him for filling in Hanover and Conway-streets, under the direction of the city commissioners: For filling in Conway and Lee-streets, a sum not exceeding six hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners: For filling in Fish-street, a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners: For each of the city commissioners and their clerks, five hundred dollars, their salary the ensuing year: For paving the south-east end of South-street (provided that the proprietors thereon pave at the same time half the street) a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars: For keeping in repair Great York-street from the stone-bridge east of Harford-street to the limits of the city eastward, a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners: To the harbor-master, his salary for the ensuing year, fifteen hundred dollars: For building a mud-machine scows & other apparatus that may be necessary for the preservation of the harbor, a sum not exceeding four thousand dollars, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, with the approbation of the mayor: To erect a watch-house in Market street

between Fleet and Alisanna streets, in the seventh ward, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, with the approbation of the mayor, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars: For the repair of Hill-street, the sum of fifteen dollars: For placing stepping stones at the intersection of Caroline and Wilkes' streets, twenty five dollars—which sums shall be expended under the direction of the city commissioners: For graveling that part of the west side of Market Space lying south of the paved part thereof, one hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners: For the superintendent of streets for the western district, one hundred dollars; and for the superintendent of the eastern district, sixty dollars, in addition to their salaries: For repairing pumps, a sum not exceeding fourteen hundred dollars: For placing stepping or flag stones in Baltimore-street at the intersection of the several cross streets from Harrison to Calvert street, inclusive, a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners: For filling up the gully in Smith-street, between Harford and Market street, two hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners: A sum not exceeding five thousand dollars to defray the expense of purchasing a water lot, and wharfing in the same for the use of the city, to be expended by Henry Payson, Jacob Small and Baltzer Schaeffer, in conjunction with the mayor: For John Hargrove one hundred dollars, as a compensation for his transcribing bills, passed at the present session of the city council: For the register of the city, five hundred dollars, as a compensation for his services in preparing a correct index and marginal notes to the ordinances passed, and those declared permanent at the present session of the city council, and correct references to all such acts of the legislature as relate to the police and regulations of the city, before it was incorporated, with notes, to be by him prepared, expressive of the contents of said acts—and for collating, revising and abridging said ordinances: For the payment of the journal of accounts, &c. four hundred fifteen dollars and fifty cents; & that the mayor be authorized from time to time to draw on the register to the amount of the aforesaid several appropriations for their respective purposes, who is hereby directed to lay before the city council a particular account of the expenditures of said money with the vouchers therefor: And be it enacted and ordained, That there be and hereby is appropriated the amount of the several sums, which have been expended during the last year, in completing the different objects for which inadequate appropriations were made, the said expenditures appearing to have been proper and necessary: And be it enacted and ordained, That the several annual salaries herein mentioned be payable quarterly. NEW-YORK, May 12. To prevent improper impressions abroad, we are desired to say, that the paragraph in yesterday's Gazette relative to a certain Broker, alluded to Horace Johnson.

PHILADELPHIA, May 13. Yesterday arrived, brig South-Carolina, Captain Serill, 7 days from Charleston.—By him we learn that the captain of the British ship Driver, had sent up to request a pilot, as he would go to sea as speedily as possible.

Yesterday a British hired schooner was captured by four Spanish gun boats in the Gut, she was commanded by a lieutenant of the navy, had dispatches from admiral Duckworth for the British government—left admiral Duckworth with 14 sail of the line at anchor by the Dardanelles, as the Turkish government had refused permission for the fleet to go up. The Turkish fleet was at Constantinople ready for sea, consisting of 17 ships of the line; this is the report received from said schooner previous to her being taken.

Notwithstanding the severe punishment which the late act of Assembly inflicts on persons guilty of forgery, we find that there are men hardy enough to risk their lives on the event. On Wednesday morning, as we learn, a person who calls himself William Ross, and says he is the son of Robert Ross, of Philadelphia, was apprehended and committed for forging a note in the name of William Ross, and endorsed J. M. Ross. He had procured the note to be drawn to Mr. C. B. Young, broker, of this city; who, suspecting its genuineness, made the proper inquiries, and detected the fraud. It is said that he confesses that he has written and signed several notes, which had been lodged with other brokers.

Enterprise, of Baltimore, sailed from Porto Rico on the 25th ult. for some of the out and ports. The schr. Sampson, capt. Gilpin, has arrived at Nassau, N. P. in 15 days from Georgetown, Maryland.

Ticket number 13895, in St. Paul's Parish Lottery, which drew a prize of two thousand dollars on the 23d day, is, we understand, owned by the relief of Peter Caffat, late of this city.

Left at the Cape of Good Hope, ship Pekin, of Philadelphia to sail in 2 days for Madras. Met an American ship going into the Cape as the Oriental came out.

New-York, May 12. Arrived schr. Rolla, Follie, 7 days from Savannah. The loop Semiramis, Sloum, 6 days from Charleston; brig Fox, Wainright, fr. Kingston for Philadelphia was captured 13 days since in the latitude of Charleston by the Driver and ordered for Halifax. David Southward with about 6 other American seamen, who had been taken out of American vessels which the Driver had captured, were landed at Charleston.

Resolved, that the directors of the library company of Baltimore be, and are hereby authorized and enjoined to form a fund, to be composed of the additional annual payments of two dollars, together with such part of the accruing monies of the company, as they in their discretion may, from time to time, set apart for the said purpose, towards the purchase of a suitable lot of ground, and erecting a commodious building for the deposit of the company's books, for the extension of the institution, and maintenance of the same.

3. Resolved, that the directors whenever they may judge it proper, shall apply to the general assembly of Maryland, for permission to establish a lottery or lotteries, to aid the said fund for the purposes and uses before mentioned.
