

LONDON, Match 27.

The Porte has shut the navigation of the Black Sea against the flags of every nation, until a general peace. All the cargoes, on the route for Frankfort to Thorn, have been placed in requisition by the French, for the conveyance of conscripts to the army. Marshal Brune is to replace Mortier in the command of the army before Stralsund, Mortier being nominated to the command of the 3d division of the army—Brune had not, however, on the 22d, made any preparations for leaving Hamburg. The greater part of the stores collected by forced requisitions for the supply of Magdeburg, have been sent to the army on the Vistula.— [John Bull—gulled] Count Koscinsky, who commanded one of the Polish legions, and was taken by the garrison of Colberg, has been executed as a traitor.— [Memento!] General Michelson had his head quarters in the neighborhood of Widden, on the 7th ult. The Russians occupied Widden, the partizans of the late Pafwan Oglou having been dispersed since his death. The Prussian prisoners, in the department of La Meurthe, have been forced into the service of Spain; a body of Russian and Prussian Poles, sent prisoners to Hamburg have, in like manner, been forced into the Dutch service.

BOSTON, May 18. Spanish decree against neutrals.—The Spanish decree of the 13th March, signed by the prince Generalissimo-Admiral, (late prince of peace) has declared that all English property found on board neutral vessels, shall be confiscated, though consigned to Spanish subjects; all goods found on board neutral vessels, if shipped for English ports or her islands, shall also be confiscated. This decree also recognizes the French blockading decree of November 21, 1805.

NEW-YORK, May 18. On Saturday morning, Mr. Howes, second officer of the ship "Pallenger," put a period to his existence with a pistol.—He was a mottled man; young man, & a valuable officer. The following is a copy of a letter which he wrote to Captain Copping, just before his death: "DEAR SIR, Having a wish to leave the world, I had determined on closing my life when I got to sea—but finding, by that means, I should unjustly injure you, by leaving you without an officer, I determined on it this morning. For the favors I have received from you accept my thanks. I owe the world nothing. HOWES. Saturday morning, 1 o'clock." The preceding evening, a shoe-maker terminated his existence with a knife.

The British sloop of war "Driver" failed from Charleston on Monday last. The captain got a supply of water from Sullivan's Island, and provisions from an English Guineaman in the harbor. The ship "American" from Londonderry, lay in the river several days, and had no communication with the shore. She failed with the "Brutus," arrived at Philadelphia, and brings no news.

Captain Hudson from St. Catharines informs, that a few days previous to his failing a Portuguese sloop had arrived at St. Catharines from Montevideo, the captain of her reported that Montevideo was captured by the British on the 3d of Feb. last. *Charleston Courier.*

PHILADELPHIA, May 18. A gentleman passenger in the ship "Louisiana," now in the river, came up to us last evening, and informs us, that they left Marseilles the 4th of April. He has on board if he recollects rightly the 68th or 69th Bulletin, containing advices of a fresh engagement between the Russians and French, in which the latter claim the victory. This action is said to have taken place, in the neighborhood of Konigsburg, which place was invested. As we already have accounts from Paris of the 30th March and from Bordeaux of the 4th of April, both silent as to this event, we apprehend there must be some mistake in this report. The gentleman also informs that accounts were received at Marseilles of an advantage obtained over the Russians by the Turks—So we go!

Extract of a letter from Cape Francois dated April 1.—"The commerce of this country is much more shackled now than ever it was during the latter time of Desalines' despotic reign. By a decree of Gen. Christophe, the price of Coffee, throughout his jurisdiction, is fixed at 25 sous, and it must be purchased from Government only.—The planters are not permitted to dispose of it to individuals.—Beef, Pork, Wine, Oil, Soap, Gin, with several other articles usually shipped to this country, are selling for less than cost in America. In fact, I do not see any thing short of ruin laying waste in the face who are so wild as to adventure to this country in its present distracted state. The coast has been clear of privateers of late, and vessels dropping in every day. Faction is much more favorable to commerce than the petty tyrant who commands here."

Gen. Eaton, who is to appear as a witness on the trial of Burr, passed through this city on Saturday, on his way to Richmond.

HUNTINGDO, May 7. A letter from a friend in Canoe Valley states, that a Malignant Fever rages in that place. Out of one family, (Mr. Christian Harshbarger's) four persons have died—his Wife on the 2d, one son on the 12th and two others on the 27th ultimo. One or two of Mr. H's family are yet confined, and we understand Mr. Daniel Sprankle of the same place, also fell a victim to that disease on Friday last.

The schooner "Experiment," of Baltimore, capt. Loring, bound to Montego-Bay, (Jamaica) was taken the 2d of April after three hours chase by a French schooner, of 18 guns. The privateer came alongside within pistol shot, and fired about 50 musket balls on board. One of the officers came on board, took the speaking-trumpet, and bear it all to pieces over capt. Loring's head; then took capt. Loring on board the privateer, the captain of which took his trumpet and served captain L. in the same man-

ner; then plundered him of almost all his clothes, and robbed the vessel of articles of considerable value; afterwards they put men and aprize master on board and ordered him for a Spanish part of St. Domingo. On the 4th of April was retaken by an English brig of 14 guns, and sent into Kingston, Jamaica. Lat. 35, 24, long. 70, was spoke ship Active, Frank, from Baltimore, returning leaky; could not carry much sail. The Joseph and Phoebe, of Baltimore, arrived at Londonderry early in April.

COURT OF VICE-ADMIRALTY, Nassau, (N. P.) April 16, 1807. Before the Worshipful Henry Morton Dyer, Esq. Sole Judge and Commissary. Enterprize, Fitzgerald, Master—a further proof case.—Mr. Armistrong solicitor general, exhibited further proof in further support of the claim of Messrs William and John Craig of New-York, which he prayed to be admitted, and the goods to be restored as claimed. Mr. Kerr prayed the same to be rejected and the said goods to be condemned.

His honour the Judge having heard the said proofs read, and the arguments of advocates and proctors on both sides thereon, was pleased to admit the same, pronounced the said goods to have belonged as claimed, and by interlocutory decree, directed the same to be restored to the claimant or his representative, for the use of the owners and proctors thereof.

Sally, Johnson, Master—A further proof case. The Solicitor-general exhibited a letter from Lirk and Lucens of Charleston, Merchants, with an attestation annexed wherein he prayed that further time be allowed them to produce the proofs required by the decree of the court of the 13th of January last.

Mr. Kerr objected that the time granted had expired on the 13th inst. and numerous vessels had failed for and arrived from Charleston, in the interval; wherefore he prayed the application for further time to be rejected, the claimants put in *po nam*, and the goods to be condemned.

His honor the Judge having heard the said letter and attestation read, and as also the petition for condemnation, and the arguments of Advocates and Proctors on both sides thereon, was pleased to extend the time therefore granted to bring in further proofs until next court day.
