TO THE COMMANDERS, OFFICERS, AND SEAMEN IN GENERAL, OF THE UNITED STATES.

GREAT part of the maritime world is already abundantly furnished with the value and importance of ascertaining the longitude at sea by lunar observations.
It is universally allowed by the most eminent mathematicians and astronomers, that the method of finding the longitude at sea by observing the distance between the Sun and Moon, or a fixed Star, commonly called lunar observations, is the best that learning and genius have been able to devise; and therefore any improvement that may be made in reducing the observed to the true distance, must be highly acceptable to the practical navigator.
The principal difficulties have been in the calculations, for refraction and parallax; to perform which and thereby bring the subject within the reach of every seaman, a short, simple and accurate method has long been a desideratum. The proximity of most methods now generally used, has deterred many respectable seamen from attempting to learn that eminently useful branch of nautical science. From these considerations, and a wish to contribute as far as he was able, to every useful improvement for the advantage of his fraternity, the subscriber was induced to publish DRYDEN'S LONGITUDE TABLES, accompanied by a formula directing the process; by the assistance of which any person of moderate comprehension may perform the operation of clearing the distance, and afterwards, by a comparison of the computed and predicted distances in the nautical almanac, find the apparent time at Greenwich, the difference between which and the apparent time at the ship, summed into longitude, gives the longitude of the ship. The publisher has used these tables for several voyages to every part of India, and always found the distance corrected by them strictly to agree with those corrected by Mackays, Dunthorns, or any method with which he compared them. They are also generally used by the officers in the English East India Company's service, to whom the author had the sole privilege of teaching them. When mariners now unacquainted with the lunar method, have experienced its superiority to the dead reckoning, which at best, is but an uncertainty, they will approach the land after any passage, with a confidence and certainty known only to proficient in the science.
Should the publication of these tables contribute to diffuse a more general knowledge of this subject among my seafaring brethren, I shall be proud of having had the honor of introducing so useful an improvement into the United States.
