

If the defendant alleges that there was any particular order which, as a cause, produced any particular act on his part, then he must show what that order was, can specify it, and a prompt answer can be given. If the object had been specified, we might then have had some guide for our conjectures as to what part of the executive records might be useful to him. But, with a perfect willingness to do what is right, we are without the indications which may enable us to do it. If the researches of the secretary at War should produce any thing proper for communication & pertinent to any point we can conceive in the defence before the court, it shall be forwarded to you. I salute you with esteem and respect.

Some conversation ensued about the specification of the papers wanted from the executive. Mr. Hay stated, that in his communication to the P. to which this letter was a reply, he had mentioned the papers in those terms, in which he conceived it would be most likely that they would be described by the opposite counsel. It seemed, however, that the President did not consider this description as sufficient—Col. B's counsel then stated, that they had sent an express to Washington for these papers, with a subpoena to the President; and that it would appear on the return, whether they could obtain such papers as they wanted.

The rest of the session of the court was occupied by the question which was yesterday suggested respecting Mr. Willie.—Mr. Martin will close the debate this day.

COMMUNICATION.

The house of appeal recommenced their sittings at London on the 16th of April last, after a suspension of all proceedings for more than 15 months.

Upwards of sixty American claims were waiting to be heard. The first argued was that of the Active Storehouse, on the 17th of April, for N. Orleans. This ship had been captured by the privateer Turk, in December 1804, & her cargo condemned by the Vice-Admiral's Court at Antigua, upon the plea that the claimant had acquired a French domicile.

Judge Diani, made the case of the Harmony, Boob, the ground for the condemnation of this cargo.

For the Claimant, Sir John Nichol, & Doct. Lawrence.

For the Captors, Mr. Stephen, author of War in Diguife.

Much learning & ability was displayed in the argument, on both sides.

Sir John Nichol, was truly eloquent, & drew strong distinctions between this case and that of the Harmony.

Doct. Lawrence, was as usual very successful on points of law.

Mr. Stephen, exhibited an affecting picture of the calamities of war, protracted as he said by the evasion of neutrals, in the support of the enemies of G. Britain.

On the 18th of April, their Lordships pronounced in favor of the appeal, and restored in the usual way.

INDIAN ALARM.

Extract of a letter from St. Mary's, dated May 31, received this morning by a gentleman of this city.

"We are very much agitated with an Indian alarm, which, I am really inclined to think, will cause a failure of our June court. Two Indians have been down St. Mary's river, to a place called Traders Hill, and killed a man of the name of Greene, in a most horrid and cruel manner. It appears, that they were well fed and treated by Greene; after which he took his seat in a shade out at the door, when they both took their guns, fired through him, and cut open his bowels with their knives. His wife and children, we understand, were not molested in their escape.

"William Ashley and some others went after them two days since, if I mistake not; and last night, about twelve o'clock, an express came with orders from General Floyd, ordering out our troop of horse in pursuit of the offenders, and some of the foot, if necessary, are gone."

The mails of yesterday brought no intelligence of importance: Several articles claiming a secondary interest have come to hand, and shall appear with all convenient expedition. We deemed it best to postpone them till to-morrow, in order to make room for the proceedings, (which are growing daily more consequential in the public estimation,) relative to Col. Burr's conspiracy & treason, of which he stands charged. To do this with more effect, we have accompanied to-day's paper with a Supplement, which enables us to lay before our readers the whole of the progress of the case as far as it has come to hand. It is a rich treat for the public at large, and for lawyers and politicians in particular.

We have been prevented publishing the 71st and 72d bulletins of the French Grand Army this morning, because the gentleman who so politely favored us with the loan of the Paris papers on Friday, took them out of our possession before we had time to make the necessary translations. They however, contain no notice of any event of importance, except such as has already been mentioned in the American.

From a recollection of what we saw in those Paris papers whilst in our possession, it would seem that Russia is in a most critical situation; that the checks which Benningsen had received at and previous to the battle of Eylau, compelled him to respect the French winter-quarters; that vast bodies of troops had arrived to reinforce the French grand army, which in the course of fifteen days had received an accession of strength of at least 60,000 men; and that unless the Russian Emperor accepted the terms of peace offered by Bonaparte, the campaign of the spring would open with a coup de guerre which, if unpropitious to the Russians, would shake the throne of Alexander to its centre.

By our English paper we learn that

the elections for the New Parliament were going on in England; and, as usual, many disgraceful scenes and much animosity were exhibited. Two of the candidates, Paul & Burdett, had fought a duel, both of whom were wounded the second fire. Their wounds are not mortal.

Great talk prevailed in England of sending troops to the continent to aid in opposing the progress of the French arms. If they are not very quick in their movements, they will hardly reach the scene of action time enough to be IN AT THE DEATH.

The editors of the New-York Gazette have received by the ship Mary and Nancy from Liverpool, London papers and Lloyd's list to the 2d of May inclusive. The former contain nothing of moment.

The witnesses who were sent out by government to attend the trial of Captain Whitty, have returned in the Mary and Eliza, except Robert Mitchell, pilot, who is coming out in the first ship from Greenock.

NASSAU, N. P. June 4.

By a late arrival at this port from Port Paix, (St. Domingo,) we learn that the town had been set fire to on the 16th ult. and at the time this vessel was there, on the 21st, it was then burning and nearly reduced to ashes, with the exception of the church and hospital, which has escaped the ravages of the flames.—The town was totally deserted, and the only information that could be obtained was from three negroes, who, on discovering the vessel, had come from the mountains; they were totally ignorant as to the cause of the town being burned, and stated that Gen. Christophe was there on the day previous to the conflagration, and had suddenly quitted the place.

May 29th, lat. 41, long. 43, was spoken, the schooner Leferon, 35 days from Bordeaux for Baltimore.

VACCINATION.

PATRONIZED BY BONAPARTE.

The Emperor Napoleon has ordered appropriate medals to be given to the most distinguished promoters of vaccination in France. This honor has not been confined to physicians. In the Rochelle Gazette we find mentioned, that "The Abbe St. Medard, vicar general of the Bishopric of Rochelle, having acquired a knowledge of vaccination while resident in England, exerted himself on his return to France, by his discourses, his writings and experiments, to spread this new inoculation first through his parish, then through the district where he resided, and his benevolent exertions were crowned with the greatest success. The Emperor, says the Gazette, whose piercing and ever watchful eye, never omits any opportunity to stimulate the zeal of all discoveries useful to society and beneficial to the human race, has ordered, after the application of the committee of vaccination at Paris, a medal to the Abbe de St. Medard; The Sub-Prefect of Rochelle, wishing to give to the ceremony all the solemnity possible, invited all the authorities, military, civil and judiciary, the bishop and his clergy, the gentlemen of arts, doctors of physic and health officers, and members of different literary societies of Rochelle, and in the midst of this assembly the Sub-Prefect presented the Abbe de St. Medard, with the medal, which he accompanied with a discourse which discovered the talents of an able writer and a wise administrator.

At a court of general sessions of the peace, held in aid for the city and county of New York at the city-hall of the said city, the following persons convicted during the sessions received sentence:—

Petit Larceny. Samuel Ferris, convicted on his own confession of stealing the property of Briggs Pinckney, four months confinement in the city prison. Mary Clark, for stealing the goods of Nancy Brittain, 30 days do. Philip Sansom, convicted on two separate indictments of stealing the property of Nicholas Chester and Leonard Seaman, sixty days confinement in the city prison. James McKenna for stealing the goods of James Hill, and Hannah Ritter (a slave of Joseph Williams) for stealing the property of Nicholas Chester, 20 days each in the city prison. William Clark, alias William Robinson, for stealing the goods of Isaac Parker and Frances Gantz; and Patrick Smith, for stealing the goods of Japesh Pell, 1 year each at hard labour in the state prison.

Disorderly Houses.—John Brown, convicted of keeping a house of ill fame, to be confined 60 days in the city prison. William Goss, a young man about 25 years of age, was convicted of keeping a disorderly house in Upper Reed street; but the court suspended its judgment on condition of his entering into recognizance to leave the state within 20 days. The examination of evidence in the case of this young culprit exhibited a scene of horrid obscenity the most revolting to nature. He is preparing, we understand,

to emigrate to Boston; and we notice this circumstance that the police of that city may have an eye upon his conduct.

A number of persons were convicted of assaults and battery; but there was no trial for grand larceny, nor do we recollect so slender a calendar of convictions for petty offences.

Departed this life, on the 12th instant, in the 59th year of his age, PHILIP FORD, Esq. of Saint Mary's County. That circle of society in which his worth was known, will long revere his virtues, and deplore their loss. To his family the privation is irreparable; to his friends it will be the subject of long and painful remembrance.

Yesterday, at a quarter past ten o'clock in the morning, departed this life, after a lingering illness, which he bore with fortitude, JOHN PETER MITCHELL, aged 24 years. He died composed, with an assurance of future bliss. His corpse will be removed from the house of the widow Mitchell, in Market-Space, at half past five o'clock this afternoon.
