LONDON, April 21.

A very melancholy circumstance happened in Harwich harbor last Saturday. A detachment of the 8th regiment, now in Harwich Barracks, embarked at Lamdgard Fort, where they had been on duty on board a small vessel, for the purpose of joining the Regiment, very soon after they set sail, a sudden squall upset the vessel, which very soon after sunk, and shocking to relate, Captain Dawson, 59 privates, eleven women and seven children were drowned.

Extra of a letter from Holywell, Flintshire, dated April 7—"A most melancholy accident happened here yesterday; 27 men were killed in a coal mine, owing to a fire damp arising. They were drawn up in the course of the day, but so mangled, as scarcely to be known by their relations. The scene of distress that took place, matters all description; wives screaming out for their dead husbands, children for their fathers; one poor woman, as soon as she saw her husband fell into a fit and expired immediately; another, from the fright, immediately fell into labour and was delivered on the spot. The men were obliged to use all their endeavours to hinder them from jumping into the pit.

Admiral Duckworth has the character of being a cautious rather than an enterprising officer, and we cannot therefore suppose he embarked in the expedition without ascertaining that his force was adequate to the occasion. We owe it to the high character which he has heretofore maintained, to believe, that he has done his duty. From the details which have reached us through the Foreign Journals, there certainly appears much cause for censure, but we must not take the report of an enemy to the prejudice of an officer who has given distinguished proofs of his loyalty and courage.

The works which have lately been constructed for the defence of Constantinople, by Captain Boutin, of the French Artillery, are calculated to oppose serious obstacles to any future attack. On the 8th of March they mounted nearly five hundred pieces of ordnance.

Yesterday the American Merchants entertained their Minister, Mr. Monroe, at the London Tavern, previous to his departure for the Continent.

An English dictionary has been published in Philadelphia, by an author of the name of Webster, who asserts that it contains 5000 more words than are to be found in the best English dictionary previously published.

A woman, named Amelia Butcher, died last week in Suresbury, aged 164 years. She declared that she broke her heart for the loss of her husband, who died about seven years ago!!!

MONTE VIDEO.

The following Letter presents matter of some interest: "The treasure is immense; some calculate 30 millions sterling. During the siege, they loaded a French frigate, and two gun-brigs, with dollars, which they cowardly let fire to, on the morning the town surrendered. About 20 defectors from the British camp, and three Americans, that had possession of one of the Spanish batteries, and would not surrender, are to be hanged, together with the whole of the crew of the Jane Shore Guineaman, that had mutinied and killed their officers."

"The country is in a state of nature, with out cultivation, but still produces luxuriantly. A bullock will cost about a dollar, and a horse about three or four rials. Wool, and hides, tobacco, tea, and chocolate, in heaps, lay out in the fields, perhaps walled about, in some places, with cowhorns and bones. The city contains 200,000 inhabitants, who are very busy in the face. The women dress modestly, and seem a little curious to gaze at strangers.

"There is a great demand for clerks; and tradesmen can easily make a fortune in a short time. The Aurora arrived. Neither the Garland nor Mary are yet arrived. I saw 14 dollars paid for a quire of common writing paper, and 38 1/2 for a glass to a watch."

Another Letter, after alluding to the desperate attack on the town, says, "The climate seems to agree very well with me; and tho' the heat is very oppressive, the air has all the salubrity it is to be desired for."

THE KING V. ROBERT GRAMANT. Our Readers may recollect the trial of this Defendant, who was a school teacher in Hackney, at the Academy of Mr. Barnes, late Mr. Peckborne's. The Chief Justice having read the particulars of the evidence,

The Attorney-General addressed the Court in mitigation of the punishment; he said: that the proceedings were had, in consequence of the pre-treatment of the son of General Lyman at the institution we have named. It happened, that General Lyman, who was here on an important mission, had been disposed to place his son at school, with conditions that he should suffer no corporal punishment; and certain it was, that the opinions in America, on youthful subordination, were very different from those which were entertained on this side the Atlantic. The Learned Council did not mean to complain of the verdict; but he was confident that the court would extend that humanity towards his client, which the peculiar circumstances of his case demanded.

After a few observations from Mr. Garrow and Mr. Gurney on behalf of the prosecution, wherein they explain'd the evil consequences which must arise from excessive severity in the education of the youthful mind.

Mr. Justice Groke delivered the sentence of the Court. He said that the Defendant was to receive the sentence of the Court for an assault upon one of his pupils. The question submitted to the Jury was, very properly, if the correction applied to the young Gentleman exceeded the bounds of moderation, and they thought that it did, found the Defendant guilty. Under this circumstance, the Court had to determine on what punishment should be inflicted on the delinquent who had unhappily forgotten, that one of the first lessons he had to impress, was the command of his inordinate passion; and instead of inculcating this by his example, he had acted precisely the contrary. The Court has taken into consideration the character of the Defendant, that he was an excellent teacher and of mild manners, and the sentence therefore was, that he should pay to the King a fine of 50 and be committed to the Marshalsea until such fine be paid. The fine was immediately paid.

The Kenise Gazette, which was received at the office of the American, per the John and Joseph, in addition to the letter of admiral Duckworth which we published on Saturday last, contains the following:—

Royal George, off Constantinople, February 21, 1867.

My Lord,

I had the honour of transmitting to your Lordship, by the late first Lieutenant of the Aurora, the various details relating to the transactions of the Squadron till the 17th ultimo. Your Lordship will from thence have been informed of my resolution of passing the Dardanelles the first fair wind. A fine wind from the Southward permitted me to carry it into effect on the morning of the 19th.

Information had been given me by his Majesty's Minister, Mr. Arbuthnot, and Sir Thomas Louis, that the Turkish Squadron, consisting of a sixty four gun ship, four frigates, and several corvettes, had been given for some time at anchor within the inner Galle; and conceiving it possible they might have remained there, I had given orders to Rear Admiral Sir Sidney Smith to bring up with the Thunderer, Standard, and Active, and destroy them, should pur passage be opposed.

At a quarter before nine o'clock the whole of the Squadron had passed the outer Galle, without having returned a shot to their fire (which occasioned but little injury). This forbearance was produced by the desire of his Majesty's Minister, expressed to preserve every appearance of amity, that he might negotiate with the strongest proof of the pacific disposition of our Sovereign towards the Porte: a second battery, on the European side, fired also with as little effect. At half past nine o'clock, the Canopus, which on account of Sir Thomas Louis' knowledge of the channel, joined to the steady gallantry which I had before experienced, had been appointed to lead, entered the narrow passage of Sestos and Abydos, and sustained a very heavy cannonade from both Castles, within point-blank shot of each. They opened their fire upon our ships as they continued to pass in succession, although I was happy in observing that the very spirited return it met with had so considerably diminished its force, that the effect on the sternmost ships could not have been to fever.

I immediately to the N. E. of the Castles, and between them and point Peliques, in which a formidable battery had been newly erected, the small Squadron which I have already alluded to were at anchor. The Van division of our Squadron gave them their broadsides as they passed, and Sir Sidney Smith with his division closed into the middle, and the effect of the fire was such that in half an hour the Turks had all cut their cables to run on shore. The object of the Rear Admiral was then to destroy them, which was most rapidly effected; as in less than four hours the whole of them had exploded, except a small corvette, and a gun boat, which it was thought proper to preserve. I enclose to your Lordship, a statement of their number, and when I add also an account of the loss his Majesty's ships have sustained, I cannot help expressing my satisfaction that we have suffered so lightly; as, eight hundred weight made such a breach between us and water, as they have done in our sides, the ship must have sunk; or had they struck a lower mast in the centre, it must evidently have been cut in two; in the rigging too, no accident occurred that was not perfectly arranged in the course of the next day. The spirit fall yard of the Royal George, the Gull of the Canopus, and the maintop-fall yard of the Standard, are the only spars that were injured.

It is with peculiar pleasure that I embrace the opportunity, which has been at this time afforded of bearing testimony to the zeal and distinguished ability of Sir Sidney Smith; in the manner in which he executed the service entrusted to him was worthy of the reputation which he has long since so justly and generally established. The terms of approbation which the Rear Admiral relates the conduct of Captain Dacres, Talbot, Harvey, and Murray, which from my being under the necessity of passing the point of Peliques before the Van could anchor, he had a greater opportunity of observing than I could, cannot be but highly flattering; but I was a more immediate witness to the able and officer like conduct which Captain Moubary displayed in obedience to my signal, by destroying a frigate with which he had been more particularly engaged, having driven her on shore on the European side, after she had been forced to cut her cables, from under the fire of the Pompee and Thunderer. The sixty four having run on shore on Peliques point, I ordered the Republic to work up and destroy her, which Captain Legge, in conjunction with the boats of the Pompee, executed with great promptitude and judgment. The battery on the point, of more than thirty guns, which had been completely finished, was in a position to have annoyed the Squadron most severely in passing, was taken possession of by the Royal Marines and boats' crews of the Rear Division; the Turks having retired at their approach, and the guns were immediately spiked. This service was performed under the direction of Captain Nicholls, of the Standard's Marines, who I trust and enterprise can never be doubted; but as circumstances rendered it impracticable to effect the entire destruction of the Redoubt, orders were given by Sir Sidney Smith to Captain Moubary, which I fully approved, to remain at anchor near the Peliques, and to employ Lieutenants Carroll and Arabin, of the Pompee, and Lieutenant Lawrie, of the Redoubt and guns, which when performed the Active was to continue in the passage of the Dardanelles till further orders.

At a quarter past five, P. M. the Squadron was enabled to make sail; and on the evening of the next day, the 30th, came to an anchor, at ten o'clock, near the Prince's Islands, about eight miles from Constantinople, when I dispatched Captain Capel, in the Endymion, to anchor near the town, if the wind, which was light, would permit the ship to stem the current, to convey the Ambassador's dispatches to the Sublime Porte, in the morning, by a flag of truce; but he found it impracticable to get within four miles, and consequently anchored at half past eleven P. M.
