Under the opinion of the court at Richmond Lorr has again escaped. Mr. Hay has announced the court he intends to pursue: His intention is to move for Burr's commitment to that place for trial where the military expedition was to have been completed. He will combine in the same motion Messrs. Smith and Blumhaffett, and would have no difficulty in entering a *not. pros.* to their trials for a misdemeanor. Gen. Dayton continues under recognizance; and Mr. Hay was disposed to believe he would be included in the motion for commitment. The attorney for the U. States had no doubt that Dayton was leagued in the general conspiracy, and if he had any (he observed) "the familiarity of the handwriting of the letter he had in his hand (Gen. Dayton's) with some he had previously seen, would have satisfied his mind."

Captain Whitney, of the ship Factor, who arrived at New-York on Wednesday last from Elmsford, informs, that the emperor Alexander had arrived at St. Petersburg, and that great rejoicings took place in consequence of this event, and of the conclusion of peace; the city was illuminated, and the vessels in the harbor displayed their colors.

The Prorogation of Parliament will take place on Friday next, and the House of Commons is expected to-morrow to adjourn to that day. *London paper.* Aug. 9.

**POSTSCRIPT.**

*Gazette-Office.* 12 o'clock.—The brig *Tiger*, Capt. Bartlett, arrived a few hours since from London. His papers are of the same date as those brought by Capt. Wood, we have therefore nothing of interest to add to our stock of intelligence, presented in this morning's *Gazette*.

A gentleman who came passenger in the *Tiger* informs, that Mr. Munroe had not delivered any opinion relative to the probable event of the Treaty, or to any other embarrassments now existing between the two countries. He however assures us, that notwithstanding this circumstance, a very great consternation prevailed among the Americans—that they were advised by their Consignees and Friends, to leave the country as soon as they conveniently could; and that they were pretty generally closing their business for that purpose.

The *Romeo* and *Galen* were to sail in two days after the *Tiger*, viz. the 10th August.—They are not full of goods.—The *Cyrus*, *Ems*, sailed for Boston, August 5.
