

According to some letters, every thing continues in a state of perfect tranquility; except that the republic herself is a good deal uneasy. The subsidy of 250,000 livres a month, which was granted her by France, is entirely ceased; whereas the Genevese flattered themselves that this succour would have continued to the end of the year. Affairs are at present in such a situation, there being nothing to fear from enemies, that it was thought the payment of this sum might very well be dispensed with after the end of August, when it was stopped. In fact, commerce resumes its course, but the bills of the famous bank of George are still 2 per cent discounting.

Turin, Augt. 26. The British minister here has informed the court, that vice-admiral Byng had set sail from Vado, for Genoa, with eleven men of war; and had left rear-admiral Parker with six men of war to patrol in the Mediterranean, peace being duly concluded; as between or among other countries, war w^t The King's Spain, in order to give infant Don Philip time to recruit his forces, his grantee four regiments to assist the decline of Parma, Vicenza, and Guastalla, and a million of piasters, to destroy the remnant of his troops, and to continue his grand general of Spain and Italy's communications.

It is confidently asserted, that the definitive treaty is signed, and that it will speedily be made public.
