the Etreights, forwards the coast of Algarves, and afterwards to enter the Mediterranean, in order to join the Spanish squadron. The thips which aroto compole it are every day failing out of the port of Malaga, Carthagena; Barcelona, and Majorec, ore by one, in order to repair to the reflee vods. The flates of Italy have promifed to join this armeda with their galleys and fome trigares and armed webecks; and very probably will be commanded by a Span sh admiral. Beware of a division upon that head. I he republic of Venice will however content itself with craizing it the Adriatic gulph and towards the Archipelago.

As for France and Great Britain, which the above mention'd powers were in hopes would have entered into the confederacy, there is very little room to think that they will comply with the inflances of the ministers from Spain, Portugal, Genoa, &c. the interest of the trading subjects of these powers, as well as those of the Durch, class, with that of the subjects of the Italian Rates; and the more the cortains interrupt the navigation of the Mediterianean, the greater advantage will accrue to the English and Dutch merchants. The Ralians nevertheless fluttered themselves, that the court of London would have interest in the quarrel by way of reverge, becaute of the infult given by tne Algerines to the English flag, because of the taking of the prince Frederick packet boat. Besices that, it's very much doubted, whether the Maltele and Portuguele will act any otherwife than by ies, unless the Spaniards, will permit them to share in the conquelts. The Portoguele are not defirous that the Spaniards shou'd become more powerful on the coast of Africa, and the Maltele ought not to with the total ruin of the cortains in the Mediterranean, where there would then be no more occasion, for their caratans.

BOSION, November 20. A few days ago an ox was kill'd in a flaughter house in this town, one of whose thighs had a bunch or swelling upon it about the place commonly called the Pope's Eye, and upon opening it, there was taken thence a imp or rather cake of hard folid fuet, which weighed twenty two pounds, and has been viewed by a great number of curious persons. 'Tis thought an account of this uncommon and unnatural production will be fent to the Royal-Society, it being effected a greater curiofity than many that have been communicated to that body of learned gendemen.

December 4. The following letter from the Cape Sable Indians, to his excellency governor Cornwallis, was brought hi-

ther by a vessel lately arrived from Halifax; viz.

HE place where thou art, the place where thou dost lodge, the place where thou dost fortify, the place where thou thinkest to establish, the place thou desirest to make thytell master of; that place is mine.

I am sprung from this land as doth the grass; I that am a savage am born there, and my fathers before me. This land imine inheritance, I swear it is; the land which God bath

iven to be my Country for ever.

I tell thee plainly the thoughts of my heart concerning thee; w the works thou makest at Chebnaa, affords me subject of ricus resection.—My king and thy king have agreed along themselves, upon certain distribution of lands, and there-nere thou wilt that I take refuge. Thou hast taken pesselon of almost all this country, infomuch that Chequeta is my ft recourse; yet thou envielt me even that spot, thou wouldest rive me from that. This evinces me, that thou wilt oblige e never to ceale making war against thee, and rever to think an alliance with thee.—Thou glories in thy great numan alliance with thre. Thou gloriell in thy great numbetter than trust in God, who mult judge between us. orm creeping, that creeps, knows how to defend itself when incked; forely, favage as I am, am better than a worth, and acken; jury, save and myfel, when attacked. I shall come for thee soon a yes, trust me, I will see thee.—I hope that hat I shall hear from thy own mouth will afford me some -I greet thee well.

"We had a most terrible passage of seventeen days from Boston. We were not chove fix hours from the long what before some of our deck load was walked overboard; the hind day we had a very hard gale at N. W. with snow, and a gree sea, when our vessel wou d not lie to, nor could we do any thing with her, til we have over the most part of the shingled on dick. In the mean time the sea made a continual breach a ver us, wash'd away our binacle and compasses, rails, oan, and every thing that was not lash'd fast on deck. fill'd ountile bin and theorage with water, and it was with difficulty we kep In short we had nothing but continual ourselves on deck. storms and gales of wind for the whole time, and offen ready to fink with ice and fnow on our decks, which would employ all hands for a whole day before we could flir a rope; and how we are got in it blows and fnows, and the weather is fo bed, that 'tis impossible to land our goods as yet. We could toke kettle on deck but three times the whole paffage:" Philadelphia, December 19.
