A tew days before their retreat, they furbrided and took a party of 18 men and women at some distance from the fort, in which number was lieut, Hamliton, Billy Hancfield and Alex. Winniet: They fell into the rands of the St. I had I dians, who appear a to ake the lead of this attack. They threatened capt. Handfield to kil lead of this attack. the priloners, unleis he delivered op the place; and after some menaces of the like nature, they separated, having divided thes prisoners, which was all the p'under they had to stare, exercise some filver they took from some of the inhabitance, who were returning nome from the public works here.

When the express arrived with an account of their attempti, capt. Gornam was order'd to march mimed arely with about an 100 men; but as part of his company was fick, and tings were not in reading to a march, the enemy were go e below he reach'd Minas: He is fince return'd without having met with any of them.
