baffador's house was immediately invested with a party of foldiers, who first violently dragg'd away his fecretary, Mr. Charles Sturges, traring off his clouths, and tumbling him into a diffinal deep dungeon under ground, call d the Mortimore, where he lay buffed, without light of fun or moon for above 3 weeks; and not only so dark, but so damp and chilly it was, hs might, but for the fignal favour of providence, have lost him the use of his limbs, or life itself. Asterwards 27 of the English slaves were taken, in the like manner, out of their prison. and with a Portugueze, who was one of the ambaffador's fervants, hurried into the faid more dreadful interment; and the amballador himfelt had irons brought into his house, wherewith he had been furely fettered, but for the opposition made against it by the Christian merchants; yet they have degraded him and taken off his allowance. After 23 days, one of the guards brought word to the alcade, that the fecretary was very iil, and his life in danger; whereupon he appointed him to be, led up before him; and when he understood now stedfastly willing the young man was to fuffer for, or with his mafter, the Barbarian relentic, and gave him liberty to return home again. There is not a wloor or jew suffered to approach the amoul'sdor; not so much as the Jew who was wont to shave him. There is not a letter directed to the ambassador, which is not broke open before he sees it, and interpreted to the alcade, by an English renegate or apostate. Two negroe porters, who are planted at the acroaffador's street door, have the keys of all his rooms, above and be ow; and two rufa miy foldiers are constandy posted to watch and sleep every night at his channer door; nor can his fecretary go any where abroad without a guard. The alcader finding no money arrive from Gibraltar; by the fine I mite; and that the governor had paid no regard to his protest against the ambassador, gave him to understand, that he had compelled several English merchants to sell their goods; and alto forcibly seized upon part of the king's present, defigned for the emperor, to fulfil his engagements with him; and the remainder thereof is expected every moment to be also carried away. The English merchants were frightened from the coast at these severities, till at last, that they might be induced to return and trace again as usual, the alcade ordered the captives to be released out of the Mortimore, and remitted again to the prison. On Oct. 28, arrived there the Brave Xebeque, capt. Haif vell, with letters from the governor of Gibraltar to the ambaffictor, fignifying that no money could be fent by the fail governor, till he had received a final answer from the covernment. The ambaffador has not wanted courage becoming the honour of his country, or condescension, compatible with the dign ty of his committen, enough to have gained him both respect and affection amoi g any humane and civilized people; but tho' it has been his generous ambition to diminish the numher of our captives, it has been his missortune to increase it : And thus are they waiting with Christian patience, until they can meet with some Christian relief.

## From the London Gazette.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 14. HE c neul of Aleppo has received a packet from gover-nor Wake, at Bombay, with letters from admiral Boscawen, dated the 20th of April, 1749, with the melancholy account of the lols of his Britainic majesty's, ships the Namur and Pembroke, and Apollo hospital ship, with almost all their men, in a violent storm, which began on the 13th of the faid month, in St. David's road; the admiral providentially was on shore. The, following is an account of the damage done by that

A LIST of the ships and vessels lost and damaged in the storm, on the Coromandel co. ft, the 14th of April, 1749i,

At Colderoon, near the road of Fort St. David. His majes. ty': ship Namur, of 74 guns, foundered in nine fathom water. She went out of Fort St. David road, after having taken in much water, the 13th, at 7 P. M. Captain Marshal was saved, her third leiu enant, Mr. Gilchrift, captain of marines, purser, chaplain, boats aiu, and about 40 other people; and 70 fick ofhore in the hospital: The first, second, and sourch lieucenants of marines, in all 520, were drowned.

His majefly's ship Pembroke, of 60 guns, struck on Colderoon point, and overfet, having parted her cable the 13th, at 6 P M. the made fail out of Fort St. David road, but could not clear the point; twelve men only were faved; captain Finener, and about 350 men were drowned, and all the officers, extept

a captain of marines.

A large ship drove on shore near the point, supposed to be the Apollo hospital ship, of 40 guns; she had on board 350 mee, and was seen near the point without masts, between Ludalore and Fort St. David.

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There are letters from France, and other parts, which give melancholy accounts of leveral ships being lost, there having

been very bad weather for some time past.

BOSTON, March iz.

We hear from Worcester, that on the 5th ir fant, one Mofes Mioric, a person of about 60 years of age, having occafion to go into a faw mill, as he was returning home in the beginning of the evening, unhappily reel'd off the platoral leading to the mill, and fell about 20 feet into the firem; by which fall it is thought he was stunn'd, and the water fl. w. ing over him at the same time, he instantly died. This is the fourth inflance of fudden and unnatural deaths there, within these three months.

Thursday last, as some men were getting a mak out of the dock, in order to put it on board of a brigantine, at Clarke's wharff, some of the tackles gave way, and the mast striking and capt. Watts, the commander of the vessel, kill'd time ca the spot.

Yetterday a vessel arrived here from Halifax, in Nova Scotia, by which we have advice that capt. Barclow, who had been out with a party as far as Cobequid, had brought in mosfiest Gerard, a French priest, and four Frenchmen, who had jozed the Indians at the late attack of the fort at Minas.

March 19. Since our laft, several vessels arrived here fron Halifax, and by them we are informed, that the governor htving sent three men to Minas to buy cattle, on their reum home they were surprized by a number of Indians, and carried off; with their cattle.

NEW-YORK, March 26. Yesterday the mare and a boy, belonging to the sloop leavy, capt. Arrowsmith, bound to North Carolina, in attempting 19 weigh, the anchor, as they lay in North East harbour, off staten Island, were drowned by the boat's overletting;

other men in the boat faved themselves by swimming.
