Rattletybang, crash, came a whole assortment of bottles, flasks and cigarboxes. The cadet said he stood aghast with the death sweat on him. Gen. Sheridan froze him th a stern glance, and then, turning to the inspector, said: "Do not report this case; I have taken an unfair anvantage of--. 




