The Roberts Motor. - The Roberts motor for use especially upon suburban roads has been exercising the past week upon the Pimlico and Pikesville Railway from the western gate of Druid Hill Park. on the Reisterstown Turnpike, to the gate-house on hat road, a distance of three-fourths of a mile.-We had the pleasure to make several trips back and forth on Wednesday 3d, and it made 41/2 miles in 9 minutes. Mr. Roberts took the roadbed as it was, laid with a 30-pound iron rail. The rate of speed noted makes about 30 miles per hour. All the machinery worked remarkably well and in accordance with the design of the inventor. There is no smoke or steam exhaust, and about as much noise as that made by a regular street car propelled by horses. Teams of all kinds, and private carriages with spirited horses were on the road and passed the motor and its car attached without making any demonstrations of fear, or being unduly excited. In his experiments Mr. Roberts sees where he can materially improve his remarkable invention. The "Maryland" is the first motor built. It weighs 11 tons and has been constructed to easily mount high grades and pass around sharp curves. The motor company, of which Mr. Roberts is the consulting engineer, will construct motors weighing less-say about 6 to 8 tons. Scientific men from various portions of the country have been examining it and pronounce it a remarkable invention and one calculated to revolutionize street and supurban rail-

It being operated by crude coal oil makes the fuel a great desideratum, and it is easily manageable. Among those who have examined the motor are several western street car and suburban railroad men, all of whom are pleased with it and it is understood will order for their roads. There is not the shadow of a doubt this motor would operate satisfactorily upon the York Road (for which we learn it was built). As a matter of course Mr. Tagart would be obliged to lay down steel rails on that portion of his roadroad where now he has iron, and prepare the bed for more rapid transit than he gives us at present. This, however, would be only in the progress of the age and is a small desideratum. The York Road certainly needs more rapid_transit than that now afforded by horse power. Everywhere where practicable horse power is being discarded for electricity and other power, which annihilates time and space and is a comfort, which horse power is not. Hutchins, Esq., Foreman: Sir:—The undersigned, committee appointed to examine licenses, beg leave to submit the following report: A large number of Ordinary Licenses are issued in Baltimore county, the only requirement being the recommendation of two free holders living in the immediate vicinity that the applicant for license is a proper person to keep an ordinary and the affidavit of the applicant himself that he has the required accommodations. This system is liable to great abuse, and such investigation as we He is a Baltimorean, who has become one of the best-known of Southern journalists, and a son of a very large proportion of ordinary keepers have the late Beale H. Richardson, for many years editor of the old Baltimore Argus.

Interpolation of the necessary accommodations prescribed by law. It is impossible to get witnesses who know whether or not the parties have the accommoda-tions; or if they do know who will testify to the true state of affairs. Large number of witnesses who ought to know something state that they know nothing, and without some evidence of the facts nothing can be ascertained from the License Books themselves, for they are merely a record of the li-censes issued by the Clerk. The Clerk himself has no alternative, but is required by law, upon the recommendation and affidavit above alluded to, to ssue the license. We understand that it is the duty of all Constables in the county to report violations of this as well as all other laws, and it is strange that Constables and Police Officers, when actually ummoned before the Grand Inquest, know so little about transgressions of the liquor laws in their own neighborhoods. It results in this, viz: that the present license law is one of the loosest upon our statute Books and open to the most flagrant abuses. Under this system anybody can get a license to keep an ordinary whether he be a proper person and whether he be interested in the welfare of the comnunity or not. We have numerous examples strangers—transient sojourners in the county—who are not even registered voters, who have no intersts in common with the community, taking out an ordinary license on the very day they arrive. Out of the profits which they sometimes make in one season they can well afford to pay the fines inflicted for violations of the Sunday law. Very often they

to pay a Sunday fine, they get off as well by paying a fine for selling without license. The recommenlation is obtained with great facility, and the oath of many of the applicants seem to be taken with andisturbed conscience. The whole thing is a ridic-Your Committee earnestly recommends that an improved license law should be adopted in Baltimore county, especially in view of the fact that violations of the liquor laws are on the increase in this county, principally on account of its proximity to a large city like Baltimore. Nothing could be more beneficial to this county at the present time or in the near future, than the adoption of a High License Law, similar in its provisions to that which exists in Philadelphia and which is now being agi ated in Baltimore. If Baltimore should succeed its effort for high license its adoption in this count would be an imperative necessity, otherwise we would be overrun with a saloon exodus from the
