The Hines-House Murder Trial.—The case of Oliver Hines, charged with the murder of James E. Hotse by striking him in the head with a brick on Saturday night. July 15th. 1889, at the corner of Parkin and McHenry sts., Baltimore, was removed on the affidavit of the prisoner to the Circuit Court for Baltimore County and was called for trial on nday, 21st inst., Judge Watters presiding, Major John I. Yellott, State's Attorney, prosecuting.— Mesers, William and Chas. S. Grason appeared as counsel for the prisoner, Messrs. Wm. A. Coates, Robt. S. Corse, Wm. H

talesmen, were sworn and completed the panel.

Maj. Yellott, in his opening statement, said the State would not contend for a verdict beyond murder in the second degree, as it was one of those un fortunate cases where two men got into a fight and the one hit the other with a part of a brick crush ing the skull and causing death.

Mr. Chas. S. Grason, of counsel for the defens made the statement for the prisoner. He said the parties got into an altercation and a fight; the pris oner was beaten, and had his lip cut, and, smarting under his injuries, had thrown the brick at Hotze which, unfortunately, caused his death. He read from Wharton on homicides, pp. 179 and 185, in aupport of his theory.

Dr. E. G. Keirle, ou 3 of the post mortem physicians of Baltimore, testified he made an examination of the deceased on the 16th of July, and that death was due to a fracture of the skull above the left ear; the bone was pressed in upon the brain causing death instantly. The skin was not broken on the surface, and the indications were that the blow was given by some blunt or broad weapon. Mrs. Lucy Grumbling testified to seeing the fight; heard Hines call Hotze back to get a bannana he had dropped. Hotze came back and said, "What business have you to meddle with my business?
Some words passed between the parties and Hines
struck Hotze in the face; the parties fell; Mr. Magruder separated them and Hotze moved away; Hines got loose from Magruder, picked up a piece of brick in the street, followed Hotze and struck him in the head with it. Hotze fell and never moved. Hines said, "Now I have paid him up for Mrs. Emma Wagner: Heard Hines call to Hotze to come back and get his bannana. Hotze went back and turned the corner which carried him out of her sight. Presently he returned again and his nose was bleeding. Hines came behind him and struck him on the head with a brick. He fell, and when I reached him he was dead. Joseph Limerick: Heard someone call, and the man who was killed handed his bundles to him and he went back. The parties had a fight, and they fell and were separated, and the man was

struck him in the head with a brick and he died right there. Mrs. Sarah Smith: Saw the prisoner and Hotze talking together; they parted, and Hines called after Hotze, who gave his bundles to Mr. Limerick and went back ; saw Hotze coming back again and wiping blood from his face; saw the prisoner come behind him and strike him with a brick. Mrs. Elizabeth Tivois: Saw the two men when they were parted; the large man came towards me and Hines came behind him with the brick; the gentleman fell and never moved. Just as Hines started after the man with the brick I said, "Don' do it,' and Hines replied, "You go to h—,"

Mrs. Cornelia Lusby: Saw the men scuffling ney got up : Hines broke loose from a man wh had him and picked up a brick in the street and struck the other man with it and he fell. Henry Stehle: Saw Hines throw a stone or brick it the other man and knock him down; when he reached the wounded man he was just gasping his John L. Magruder: Saw the men fighting; Mrs Grumbling called to him to stop them; he parted them and held on to Hines, who broke away from him and picked up something; I did not know what it was, and that was all I saw; they were both Officers Robert Graves and John Weaver arrested the prisoner at the corner of Penn and King streets he had a slight cut on his lower lip, and there was some blood on his face. Judge Watters on Thursday, 24th inst., passed entence on the prisoner. He asked Hines if h had anything to say, and he answered "No." The Judge then said: "I have considered your case carefully in order to do full justice to you and also the rights of the public. In your case I am disposed to look upon it as an aggravated assault, re

sulting, unfortunately for you, in the death of the party assaulted. If a deadly weapon had been sed the penalty inflicted would, of necessity, have been severe. In this case the injury was inflicted with a brickbat, therefore the presumption is n your favor that it had not been your intention a take life, and, as you have a family to take care of and to whom you seem to have paid a tention. will not be as severe as I otherwise would. I wil therefore order you to be sent to the Maryland House of Correction for one year.' The prisoner and his friends were perfectly satisfled with the verdict. Hines' mother, who is quite an aged lady, was visibly affected and gave vent to her feelings in audible weeping. The prisoner was taken in charge by Deputy Sheriff Wm. M. Risteau ind was taken to Jail and will be sent to the House of Correction at once.
