On motion by Mr. Stoddert, the further consideration of the said bill was referred to the next general assembly.

On motion by Mr. Stoddert, the following resolution was read the first and second time by special order:

Resolved, That the bill, entitled, An act to provide for the more easy administration of justice in this state, be published with the votes and proceedings, and that the governor and council be and they are hereby authorized and required, during three successive weeks, to have the same inserted in such newspapers within this state as may have the most general circulation, for the consideration of the people.

A division of the question was asked for, the question was then put, That the house assent to the first part of the resolution directing the bill to be published with the votes and proceedings? Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, That the house assent to the latter part of the resolution which directs the governor and council to cause the said bill to be published in newspapers? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

SATURDAY, February 1, 1817.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill to enforce specie payments from the several banks within this state for all bank notes not exceeding five dollars; the bill to incorporate Upper Marlborough town in Prince-George's county, and the resolution directing the bill, entitled, An act to provide for the more easy administration of justice in this state, to be published with the votes and proceedings, were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Cresap, the question was put, That leave be given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to establish a bank and incorporate a company, under the name of the Farmers Bank of Allegany? Resolved in the affirmative. Ordered, That Messrs. Cresap, Tolinson and Prather, be a committee to prepare and bring in the said bill.

On motion by Mr. R. Dorsey, Ordered, That the bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to direct descents, be made the order of the day for Monday next.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill from the senate, entitled, An act to provide for the administration of justice in cases of crimes and misdemeanors in the city and precincts of Baltimore. Mr. Kell moved to strike out from the word "line" in the 1st line of the 3d page of the bill to the word "and" in the 15th line of the same page, for the purpose of inserting the following: "bounded on the north by a line drawn parallel with Baltimore-street in the said city, through a point one mile and a half due north from the centre of Baltimore and Calvert-streets in the said city, and extending eastwardly some hundred perches from the said point to a public road passing from the Philadelphia post road, between the dwellings of Amos Loney, Thomas Worthington, and others, and westwardly six hundred and forty perches from the same point; on the east by a line binding on the east side of said road to the Philadelphia post road, and from the Philadelphia post road, by a straight line, to the north east corner of the lazaretto lot, including said lot, to the Patapsco river, at the termination of the last mentioned line, to the most southern part of Whitstone point on the main branch of Patapsco river, and running with and bounding on the said main branch, excluding the land ceded to the United States on Whitstone point for the uses of a fort, to the place called the Ferry Point, being the junction of the said main branch with the middle branch aforesaid, and thence due west to the western side of the middle branch aforesaid; and on the west by a line running from the termination of the last mentioned line, on the western shore of the middle branch, and binding on the said shore to the mouth of Gwinn's falls, thence up and with the south west side of Gwinn's falls to a point opposite to the mouth of Gwinn's run, thence with a straight course to the mouth of Gwinn's run, and thence with a straight line to the end of the aforementioned six hundred and forty perch line."

Mr. Stoddert asked for a division of the question.

The question was then put on striking out? Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, That the house adopt the amendment proposed by Mr. Kell? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the question was put to strike out from the word slave in the 4th line of the 6th page to the word "and" in the 5th line of the same page? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the word "aforesaid" was inserted after the word "precincts" in the 3d line of the 19th section.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the words "or associate" in the 3d line of the 20th section were stricken out.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the question was put, That the words "nor for any associate judge to practice in any court of law" be inserted at the end of the last section? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the question was put, That the house reconsider the 6th section of the bill? Resolved in the affirmative.
