

The report on the petition of James Eccleston of Dorchester county, was read the second time, and the question put, That the house concur therewith and assent to the resolution therein contained? Resolved in the affirmative.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

FRIDAY, January 9, 1818.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill authorising the clerk of Allegany county to record certain deeds; the bill for the benefit of Richard Barnaby of Cecil county; the bill for the benefit of John Hoyer and Mary his wife, of the town of Cumberland in the county of Allegany; the bill to incorporate companies to make certain turnpike roads through the counties of Montgomery, Frederick and Washington, and for other purposes; and the resolution in favour of James Eccleston, were sent to the senate.

The report on the petition of John Turner, of Talbot county, was read the second time and concurred in.

The further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for founding an academy in Hager's-Town, in Washington county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The report in favour of Robert Bruce a revolutionary soldier, was read the second time, concurred in, and the resolution therein contained assented to.

Mr Beard delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the establishment of a market for the sale of live stock at the Rising Sun in Cecil county; which was read.

Mr. Buckey delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, praying for a law to open and make public a road from the east end of Westminster, on the old bed of the present road, to the Baltimore county line where the deer park road intersects the same; which was read and referred to Messrs. Buckey, Hawkins and Downey.

The clerk of the senate delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the drawing of a lottery for the benefit of Charlotte Hall school in Saint Mary's county, endorsed, passed by the senate December 17, 1817; which was read.

Mr. Woodyear delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, praying for a law authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money to rent, purchase or erect, a building suitable for the purpose of a Dispensary; which was read and referred to Messrs. Woodyear, Kell and Bradford. Also a petition from the Rev. Ambrose Marechal, archbishop of Baltimore; the Rev. Enoch Fenwick rector of St. Peters church in the city of Baltimore, and others, members of said church, praying for an act of incorporation; which was read and referred to Messrs. Woodyear, Semmes and Digges.

Mr. Kennedy delivers a petition from Thomas M. Barney, of the state of Kentucky, late a soldier in Capt Benjamin Price's company of levies, raised in the year 1791, for the purpose of subduing the hostile Indians, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kennedy, Schnebly, and R. Dorsey. Also a memorial from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying relief relative to the turnpike road leading from Baltimore to Frederick-Town; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kennedy, Harrison, Downey, Scott and Yates.

On motion by Mr. Wilson, Ordered, That the bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company for the purpose of building a bridge over the river Susquehanna, be made the order of the day for Wednesday next.

Mr. Turner delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising the levy court of Calvert county to levy a sum of money on the assessable property of said county for the purposes therein mentioned; which was read.

Mr. Woodyear delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the guardians of Henry Hammond, an infant, to apply the proceeds of property for the purpose therein mentioned; which was read.

Mr. Kell delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of completing an invention in the art of war; which was read.

Mr. Harrison delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Hackett, of Queen-Anne's county; which was read.

Mr. Hawkins delivers a bill, entitled, An act annulling the marriage of Mary Henry and Charles Henry, of Frederick county; which was read.

Mr. Kennedy delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, counter to the petition for keeping open the old road leading from Funk's-Town to Boonsborough; which was read.

Mr. Hawkins delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Middle-Town, in Frederick county, praying for the erection of a bridge over the Catoctin creek; which was read and referred to Messrs. Hawkins, Downey and Nabb.

Mr. Roberts delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Queen-Anne's county, counter to the petition praying for a repeal of the act for opening and amending the public road from Church-Hill to Sudler's cross roads in said county; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

The roll of the house having been called over, and there not appearing present a quorum, the members present adjourn until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, January 10, 1818.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Hawkins delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, against the establishment of a branch of the Bank of Westminster at Frederick Town; which was read and referred to Messrs. Hawkins, Kell and Forrest.

The bill to authorise a lottery or lotteries in Frederick Town, was read the second time and passed.

The bill from the senate entitled, A further additional supplement to the act to incorporate the stockholders of the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore, was read the second time and passed.

The bill authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for the benefit and use of the German Lutheran and German Presbyterian congregation of Zion Church in Baltimore county, was read the second time and passed.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act to authorise the establishment of an additional warehouse in the city of Baltimore for the inspection of tobacco. And on motion by Mr. Woodyear, the bill was recommitted to the committee who reported the bill.
