The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

### SATURDAY, January 24, 1818.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill to provide for the removal of lunatic paupers from the several counties of this state to the hospital in Baltimore; the supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein named; the supplement to an act, entitled, An act to regulate the breadth of a certain road in Kent county, and the bill to provide for the opening and extension of Pratt-street in the city of Baltimore, were sent to the senate.

The bill to inspect and transcribe the records of the surveyor of Charles county, and for other purposes, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Price delivers a petition from Jonathan Morrison, of Baltimore county, praying for a divorce; which was read and referred to Messrs. Price, Showers and Johnson.

The report on the petition of the trustees of Brookeville Academy, was read the second time, concurred with, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act concerning crimes and punishments.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the question was put, That the blank in the first section of the bill relative to the salary of keeper be filled up with "fifteen hundred?" Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Wilson, the question was then put, That the said blank be filled up with "thirteen hundred?" Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the blank relative to the salary of the clerk and agent was filled up with "eight hundred."

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, the word "coloured" was inserted after the word "no" in the first line of the third section.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the word "private" was stricken out of the third section and the words "public, and if in the city of Baltimore at the prison yard thereof," inserted in lieu thereof.

The bill having been read throughout as amended, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The bill authorising the drawing of a lottery for the benefit of Washington Lodge No. 59, of free and accepted masons, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill from the senate, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to establish a bank and incorporate a company under the name of the Bank of Caroline, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill from the senate, entitled, An act to establish and incorporate the Patapsco Canal Company.

And on motion by Mr. Wilson the names of "William H. Winder, William Lorman, Robert G. Harper and John E. Howard, junior," were inserted after the name of "Isaac Philips," in the 4th line of the first section.

The bill having been read throughout, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill to incorporate the grand lodge of free and accepted masons of Maryland, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The resolution relative to runaway negroes, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The report on the petition of Robert Halkerson, was read the second time, concurred in, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the question was put, That the house reconsider the bill to establish and incorporate the Patapsco Canal Company? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Kell, the words "not prejudicial to the rights of the present Water Company of Baltimore," were inserted after the word "whatever" in the 5th line of the 11th section.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill returned to the senate.

Mr. Woodyear delivers a petition from sundry master coopers, merchants and traders, of the city of Baltimore, counter to the petition praying for the appointment of an inspector of staves; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

Mr. Hawkins delivers a memorial from sundry inhabitants of Frederick town, in Frederick county, and its vicinity, against the establishment of a new bank at Frederick-town; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to authorise the moderator and commissioners of Hager's-town to levy a sum of money for a fire-engine, and the bill to lay out and make public a road in Frederick and Montgomery counties, severally endorsed, will pass. Ordered to be engrossed. The bill extending the benefit of the insolvent laws to Abraham Leider of Washington county, endorsed, will not pass. Also a bill, entitled, An act to establish a bank and incorporate a company under the name of the Frederick County Bank, endorsed, passed by the senate January 24, 1818; which was read, and on motion by Mr. Forrest, the said bill was made the order of the day for Wednesday next.

Mr. Whitby delivers a petition from James M'Guire, of Queen-Anne's county, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Messrs. Whitby, W. R. Stewart, and Whiteley.
