*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

The bill for the benefit of the University of Maryland, which was agreed on by a committee of conference a few days since, and received the sanction of your body, appears to the senate to be defective in not providing a sufficient security for the payment of interest by the professors of the institution. The nature of the bill putting it out of our power to amend it, we would suggest with a view to save time, the appointment of another committee of conference on this subject. Should you agree to the appointment of such a committee, we would name on our part Messrs. Johnson, Dickinson, McKim, Brownly, Miller, Claude, Chambers and Orrill.

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Eliza Bruff, of Queen Ann's county, beg leave to report, that they have had the same under their consideration, and believing the prayer of the petitioner to be reasonable and just, recommend the adoption of the following resolution.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore, be, and he is hereby authorised to pay to Eliza Bruff, daughter of captain James Bruff, or her order, in quarterly payments, the half-pay of a captain during the term of seven years, as a further compensation for the distinguished favors rendered by her deceased father, captain James Bruff, during the revolutionary war.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 24, 1822.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill authorising the Levy Court of Frederick county to raise a sum of money to build a bridge over Big Pipe creek; the bill for the support and maintenance of Teresa Mankin, of Charles county, and her infant children, and the bill for the relief of Eleanor Hicks, of Charles county, were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Garner, Ordered, That Messrs. Dorsey and Sprigg be added to the committee relative to the Hydrant company in Port Tobacco.

Mr. Pigman delivers a communication and sundry depositions relative to the flour inspection, which were read and referred to the committee appointed on that subject.

The resolution repealing the resolution in favor of the clerk of the council, passed at December session 1817, was read the second time, assented to and sent to the senate.

Mr. Hoffman reports a bill entitled, An act for the relief of Henry Korn, of Allegany county; and Mr. Saulsbury reports a bill entitled, A further supplement to an act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein named, and for other purposes; which were read.

Mr. Maffitt presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Cecil county, praying that the road leading from the public road near North East, passing by Frederick Stages's plantation, intersects the public road from Elkton to Turkey Point may be made public; read and referred to Messrs. Maffitt, Williams and Craig.

The further additional supplement to an act entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of salted fish, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The house resumed the consideration of the reports of the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims. The resolution in favor of Ann Rawlings was read the second time and the question put, that the house assent to the same.
