

Mr. Gerry obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the levy court of Cecil county, to appoint their clerk; Ordered, that Messrs. Gerry, Sheridine and P. R. er, report the same.

Mr. Kilgour reports a bill, entitled, An act relating to the authentication of certain proceedings; also a bill, entitled, An act giving jurisdiction to justices of the peace, in trespasses for killing, wounding, or otherwise injuring horses, black cattle, hogs and sheep.

Mr. Steele reports a bill, entitled, An act authorising the appointment of a trustee for the sale of the remaining part of the Nanticocke Indian Lands in Dorchester county.

Mr. Stone reports a bill entitled, An act to alter, change and repeal such parts of the constitution and form of government of this state, as relate to the division of St. Mary's county into four election districts, passed at December session 1806, and confirmed at December session 1807; and Mr. Gerry reports a bill entitled, An act for the relief of Hyland B. Pennington, of Cecil county; which were read.

The supplement to an act, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to regulate public ferries; and the bill for the relief of Catharine Zar Buchan, a lunatic of Baltimore county; were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate; the bill relating to a road in Harford county; was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Purviance reports a bill entitled, An act for the removal of allegations against insolvent debtors, from one county to another; which was read.

The resolution proposed by Mr. T. Kennedy, relative to internal improvements; was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

Mr. J. P. Kennedy, reports a bill entitled, An act to incorporate the trustees of the poor of Baltimore city and county; which was read.

The clerk of the senate delivers the following message:

And the bill for the benefit of James C. McDowell of Cecil county, endorsed "will not pass."

The house, according to the order of the day, proceeded to the second reading of the bill to incorporate a company in Baltimore county, by the name of the Avalon company; On motion by Mr. Allen, the question was put, that the word "not" be stricken out of the last section as to make it read, "that the stockholders shall be answerable and liable in their individual capacities or private estates?" Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. John P. Kennedy, the question was put, that the whole of the said section be stricken out? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Carroll, the question was put, that the bill be rejected? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill returned to the senate.

The bill to incorporate the Asbury Sunday School; was read the second time.

On motion by Mr. Douglass, the question was put, that the word "white" be inserted before the word children so as to confirm the said school to the education of white children? Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The engrossed bills from No. 1 to No. 41, inclusive; were read, assented to, and with the paper bills sent to the senate; the clerk of the senate returns said bills, severally endorsed, read and assented to.

The bill to incorporate a company in Baltimore county, by the name of the Baltimore manufacturing company; was read the second time.
