

Whittington, Jones, Teackle, Sheredine, Gerry, Slemaker, Riley, Norris, Chauncey, Boon, Gal-  
loway, Williams, Duvall, Hoffman, Pollard, Tomlinson.—25. Resolved in the affirmative.

The resolution was then assented to, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the resolution relative to printing the daily journal, and the re-  
solution relative to cavalry, endorsed "assented to." The bill to incorporate a company to make  
a turnpike road from Hancock, in Washington county, to the Pennsylvania line; the bill to au-  
thorise Addison Belt to import certain slaves into this state, endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be  
engrossed.

The bill directing the priority of payment of debts of persons dying within this state, as re-  
lating to the state of Delaware, in certain cases therein mentioned; and the bill to prevent frau-  
dulent conveyances, and for other purposes, endorsed "will not pass."

The bill to authorise the clerks of the county courts on the eastern shore to grant licenses to  
hawkers and peddlers, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for amending and reducing into system  
the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, adminis-  
trators and guardians, and the rights of orphans and other representatives of deceased persons,  
was referred to the next general assembly.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the bill to regulate the fees of sheriffs in this state, was referred  
to the 31st day of March next. The house adjourns until 5 o'clock, P. M.

The house met.

On motion by Mr. J. P. Kennedy, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, A supplement to the  
act, entitled, An act relating to justices of the peace in the city of Baltimore. Ordered, that  
Messrs. J. P. Kennedy, Farquhar and Thomas, report the same.

Mr. J. P. Kennedy reports the said bill; which was twice read, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Thomas, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to repeal the law  
therein mentioned. Ordered, that Messrs. Thomas, Farquhar and Wright, report the same.

Mr. Thomas reports said bill; which was twice read, and on motion by Mr. Teackle, the same  
was referred to the next general assembly.

The clerk of the senate delivers the resolution in favor of the trustees of the poor, endorsed "dis-  
sented from;" the resolution relative to furnishing the government house, and the resolution in  
favor of the clerks, endorsed "assented to;" the resolution relative to making indexes, endorsed  
"dissented from;" the resolution in favor of the securities of Thomas Pollard, endorsed "assent-  
ed to with the proposed amendments;" and the resolution in favor of Henry Schroeder, endors-  
ed "assented to with the proposed amendment;" which amendments were twice read and as-  
sented to.

Also the bill to alter the time of electing the mayor, recorder, aldermen and common council  
of the city of Annapolis, and for other purposes; and the bill to incorporate a company to es-  
tablish a woolen carpet and flannel factory in the city of Baltimore, endorsed "will pass." Or-  
dered to be engrossed.

Also the supplement to an act to quiet possessions, and prevent suits at law, passed at Decem-  
ber session 1813, chap. 90; the additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act authorising a  
lottery for raising a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned, passed at November ses-  
sion 1809; the bill to repeal an act for licensing and regulating ordinary keepers, and for other  
purposes; and the bill authorising the sale of the poor house and ground belonging thereto, in  
Frederick county, and to provide for building a new one, endorsed, "will not pass."

And the bill relating to the second and third districts for choosing electors of president and  
vice president of the United States, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Wright, the bill, entitled, An act to lay a tax on billiard tables, was refer-  
red to the next general assembly.

The report and resolution in favor of Cornelius H. Mills, was referred to the next general as-  
sembly.

The bill for opening Wolf-street in the city of Baltimore, was, on motion by Mr. Ireland, re-  
ferred to the next general assembly.

The bill to withdraw the donation now given the Harford academy, and apply the same to  
the education of poor children, was read the second time.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the question was put, that the following be inserted after the  
word Maryland: "that the donation now given to the Harford academy, be and the same is here-  
by withdrawn into the treasury, subject to the future appropriation of the legislature." Deter-  
mined in the negative.

The question was then put, shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appear-  
ed as follow:
