Also resolutions relative to the mode of electing the president and vice president of the United States, endorsed, assented to; which were read—and the following message:

THURSDAY, February 19, 1824.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolutions relative to the mode of electing the president and vice president of the United States, were referred to Messrs. W. G. D. Worthington, Dorsey and Kilgour. The report of the joint committee appointed to examine the records of the land office; was read the second time, the resolution therein contained, assented to, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Peter reports a bill, entitled, an act relating to public roads, passed at November session, 1794; which was twice read, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. W. G. D. Worthington presents a petition from Louis Dietz; referred to the committee on insolvencies; and a petition from Augusta S. Smith; referred to the committee on divorces.

The report on the memorial of Thomas Hams, was read the second time, the resolution assented to and sent to the senate. The bill relative to public inspection warehouses, was sent to the senate.

Mr. W. G. D. Worthington, reports a bill, entitled, an act for the relief of Charles Delmotte, of the city of Baltimore.

Mr. W. Duvall obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, an act to repeal an act passed in 1823, authorising commissioners to lay out a road in Montgomery and Anne Arundel counties as far as therein mentioned; ordered that Messrs. W. Duvall, Howard & Peter, report the same.

Mr. Chesley reports a bill, entitled, an act to continue in force the acts of assembly, which would expire with the present session; which was twice read, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Nicholson reports a bill entitled, an act relating to the auditor general.

The bill to open and extend Franklin street, in the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The additional supplement to the act entitled, an act to authorise a lottery or lotteries to raise a sum of money for the purpose of repairing and raising a fund for the use of Washington college, was read the second time, and the question put, shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

The bill to incorporate the Agricultural Society, was read the second time. On motion by Mr. Loockerman, the question was put, that the blank in the clause appropriating a fund in aid of the society, be filled up with \$900. Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Sprigg, the question was put, that the same be referred to the next general assembly. Determined in the negative.
