R. B. Hayes has come out with an expression of deep commiseration for American sheep, in case the duty on wool is removed. It will not surprise the country to know that Hayes has been feeling sheepish for some time ever since he took Tilden's seat.

The selection of St. Louis as the place for the holding of the Democratic National Convention is a fortunate one for the Democracy, and is as nearly central as any city on the continent would be. Saml J. Tilden was nominated there in 1876, and received a majority of 260,000 of the popular vote of the country.

Our town for some time back of a Saturday night has been a regular pandemonium of noise, swearing and blackguarding in the centre of town, well into the night. If our constable would display the same amount of energy and bravery to arrest and break up this class of offenders, that he does to try and get his friends in trouble to make cost out of them, it would soon be broken up. He is one of the leaders of the Law Journal law—a law that would give to one man all the legal printing of the State. The congress will be a success if it points out the way for laboring men to act together without cutting each other's throats, without crumbling under the wild vagaries of some foolish crank who thinks he is a born leader, without becoming the prey of the politician or the plaything of the capitalist without disheartening by their failure all attempts to found a genuine flexible labor party.

A labor congress that would teach laboring men the wonderful beauty of silence, the value of quiet, patient, organized effort and the utter damnation of talk, ambition and political management, will be a memorable and useful body.

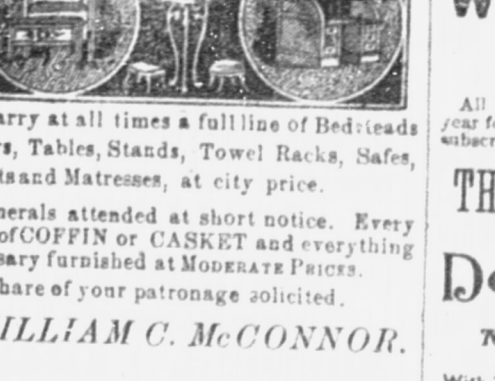

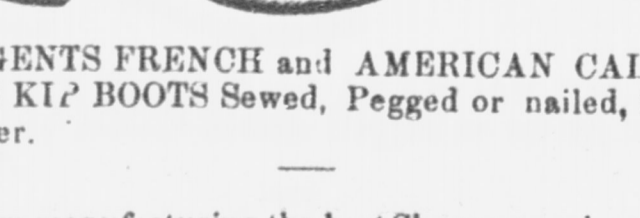
