great disapproval of the course of  
Roger Q. Mills in his Texas congres-  
sional district will derive little com-

don't read as if they were taken from  
an encyclopaedia. Well, no; there's  
not the least bit of useful information  
in them!

It was a striking feature of the  
Mills bill that the one member of  
Congress who was elected distinctly  
as a labor man heartily supported  
this measure—Henry Smith of Mil-  
waukee, a wheelwright by occupation.  
Mr. Smith has complied with a re-  
quest of the New York Star with his  
reasons for his course in a forcible  
letter. We know nothing of Mr.  
Smith beyond what is revealed by his  
letter, but he appears to be what is  
known as a "level-headed man," and  
it is very significant that a labor poli-  
tician like him, presumably well in-  
formed as to the feelings of laboring  
men, and ambitious to stand well with  
them, should occupy this attitude to-  
ward the high tariff. It is hardly less  
significant that other Congressmen  
who were elected largely by the labor  
vote, like Mr. Weaver of Iowa, are  
equally hearty supporters of the Mills  
bill.

The Labor Signal, an Indiana paper  
supported by the wage-earners, pub-  
lishes this illustration of the high  
theory of protection to labor: "A few  
years ago I spent a month in the  
Michigan pineries and while there the  
mill owners got an extension of the  
great 'American system' of protection  
to the amount of \$1 per thousand feet  
of lumber additional tariff. This ad-  
ded about \$50 a day to the net profits  
of each mill. The employees—aver-  
aging eight or ten to the mill—  
thought it was a good time to ask for  
their wages to be advanced from \$1.50  
per day to \$1.75. This would make an  
addition to the expense of the mills  
from \$2 to \$2.50 per day,  
and would still leave \$47.50  
per day profit from the increas-  
ed tariff. As the tariff was exclusively  
for the benefit of the mill owners, of  
the whole amount belonged to  
the mill owners 95 per cent.  
enhanced profit. What do you  
think of these beneficiaries of the great  
American system, did in the premises?  
Answer to the request was curt  
and refused.

district, if so divided, in which he applies to be  
registered; eighth, if naturalized, the date of his  
final papers or certificate of naturalization, and  
a minute of the Court by which the same was  
issued; ninth and tenth, if it is found, upon  
such examination, that the applicant possesses  
or before the day of election next ensuing will  
possess, the requisite qualifications, under  
the constitution of Maryland, and the laws made  
in pursuance thereof, and is not disqualified  
under the provisions of the second and third  
sections of the first Article of the Constitution  
of this State, and that the said person has not  
been registered under the provisions of this Act,  
in any other election precinct, or election dis-  
trict of this State, the said applicant shall be  
entered forthwith by said officer of registration  
in the presence of said applicant, as a qualified  
voter, by recording his name, in the same man-  
ner in which it was first recorded, in the proper  
column, of the proper registry of voters, under  
the head of "qualified voter," if the applicant  
is found to be disqualified as a voter in the elec-  
tion precinct, or election district, in which he  
shall apply to be registered a line shall be heav-  
ily drawn in ink opposite to his said name, un-  
der the head, "qualified voters," and the cause  
of his disqualification shall be briefly stated,  
opposite to his name, as first recorded, under  
the head of "disqualified," and a line shall be  
drawn across his name, as first entered, but in  
such manner that said name shall remain leg-  
ible; if the said officer of registration shall be  
in doubt, after his primary examination of said  
applicant, and of such other evidence given  
upon oath or affirmation, as may be immedi-  
ately accessible, or because of lack of sufficient  
proof, whether said applicant is a qualified  
voter, he may adjourn his determination of the  
said matter to any subsequent day of the particu-  
lar sitting then being held, but such ad-  
journment shall not, in any event, be to a time  
beyond the last day of the particular sitting at  
which application is made, on which appointed  
day the said officer of registration shall proceed  
to determine the matter in question, and to  
enter the applicant in the proper registry of  
voters, as a qualified voter, or as disqualified;  
but, it is expressly hereby declared and set  
forth, that nothing herein contained shall be  
construed as authorizing any of said officers of  
registration to ask any question of, or concern-  
ing any applicant for registration as a qualified  
voter, touching any cause of disqualification  
not expressly enumerated in the Constitution  
of this State.

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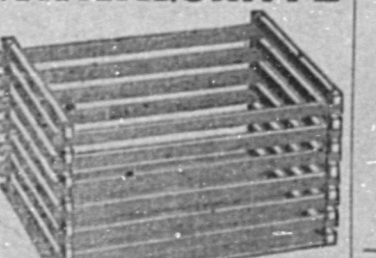
