CONDEMNED ON THE RECORD.

Since the result of the late elections was known numberless attempts have been made to explain the causes of the revulsion in public sentiment to which it was attributable. Undertaken in the excited condition of mind necessarily attendant upon an unexpected defeat on one side, and a surprising triumph on the other, these explanations have all lacked that calm and philosophical balancing of effects with causes by which alone the truth could be reached. Therefore none of the explanations thus far advanced have been satisfactory. Now, however, the turmoil and excitement that attended and followed the contest have subsided sufficiently to permit of cool and dispassionate inquiry into the real cause of the extraordinary political revolution over which every good citizen still rejoices.

Pursuing this inquiry, then, in an equitable and philosophical frame of mind necessary to such an investigation, the News is convinced that the true explanation of the political revolution of the Republican party is to be found in the fact that

organized a Tariff Commission, and recommenced the systematic robbery of the many to further enrich the few under the forms of law. Still more false pretenses.

The Democrats, having re-monetized silver in the interest of the people, the Republicans through their control of the executive offices of the Government still maintained, practically, the gold standard they had established in the interest of the favored capitalists, loudly protesting that they sought only to promote the welfare of the wage workers of the Republic. Still again a manifest case of false pretenses.

Last scene of all that ends this vile, disgraceful history: In 1888 the Republicans secured the Presidency and the House of Representatives by open and unblushing bribery. Then followed the sanctioned usurpations of Dictator Reed, the looting of the treasury, the refusal to grant the popular demand for unrestricted silver coinage, and the attempt to still further rob the people by the McKinley bill.

Such, briefly stated, is a small part of the shameful record made by the Republican party in its thirty years control of the Government.

On the whole of that record was the party judged by the free voters of the Republic as a jury, and a sweeping condemnation was the popular verdict expressed at the polls.

With everything in its favor after a long and patient trial, its own acts being the only witnesses for the prosecution, the great court of last resort, the Republican party was found guilty on one or on several, but in the formidable indictment which was tried.

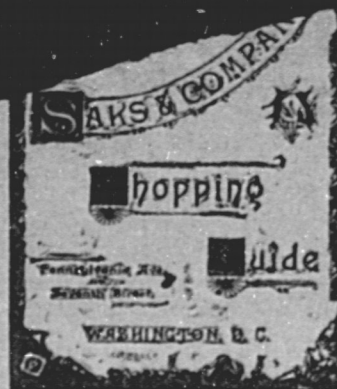
