Among the resolutions passed at the convention of Republicans at Centerville on Tuesday, we find the following:

"Pledge the nominees for the legislature, in the event of their election, to faithfully labor to secure the passage of a law preventing the destruction of the oyster bed in Queen Anne's county by the use of patent tongs."

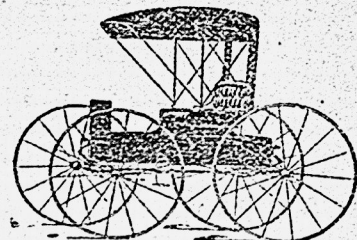
