A Philadelphia judge has decided that there is no law against a man committing suicide but he advised all not to be in a rush to shake this mortal coil as it will be a long time between acts.

Governor Smith has granted a respite to Lloyd Burke for four weeks during which time his Excellency will weigh the evidence and decide on Burke's fate, whether he will be hung or sentenced to life imprisonment. It is evident that, if Burke's attorneys can get the Governor to commute his sentence to life imprisonment then there is a show of getting him pardoned in a few years.

The Easton Gazette commenting on the case, favors commuting the sentence to life imprisonment and cites two examples of innocent persons being hung as sufficient reason, one of which we give: "And the case of Durant, the organist, at San Francisco four or five years ago, who was hung for the murder of two young girls in the church loft and the subsequent death bed confession of the minister of the church."

We fail to see any comparison. If we remember rightly, in the case of Durant the evidence was circumstantial for no one saw him commit the deed while, in Burke's case the evidence was clear and given by an innocent little child who could not possibly have shielded another man for Burke and a child who had known Burke from early childhood and who saw him nearly every day.

And again the Gazette says: "His conduct since the offence has not, it is said been that of a guilty man and he has always solemnly protested his innocence."

Why shouldn't he protest his innocence? He is an old bird at the business and his past experience has taught him how to touch the tender chords of the charitable people.

The Gazette hits: "Under the testimony as given before the jury and which only they can consider, there was no escape from a verdict of guilty and the court was bound by the same testimony."

The court was the place to produce the testimony and not bring pressure to bear on his Excellency that will make him lenient. If Burke had any testimony, it seems to us that he had ample time to get it before the court if it were this side of the grave.

Taking Burke's life since a boy and to the present day it will be found that he has been before the court several times on serious charges and a number of charges have been smothered by getting around the parties interested.

If Burke should, as it is now likely he will, be sent to prison for life and in a few years pardoned, do you think it would be safe for women to travel our county roads alone? We fear not. The pardon of Burke would increase instead of diminishing crime and our court would be made a laughing farce. As we before said, let the law have its course or else burn the laws and stop making any more and let everyone have a law to suit their own sweet ideas.

Brother Haddaway, the able pen-pusher of the Easton Ledger, had on a high pressure of steam and blew off the following:

"Women go to Annapolis to foster and promote every insane piece of legislation" and that, "the reformers go there to hinder and oppose most of the measures of wise and necessary legislation."

While the above lines are plain and to the point, for this reason alone it hurts someone's corns. There is no doubt but that Brother Haddaway saw danger ahead for Chapel district and being accustomed to a morning bracer, put up his red flag against the promoters. We have been dry so long that we feared a famine but we see relief ahead in the Marconi wireless delivery system, which we expect to install in a few days. It works thus: drop a dime in the slot and in a few minutes your sparkling, cool, healthful and wholesome beer or the produce of corn and rye is at your place of business from Baltimore or — Brother Haddaway will have to come over and see it work.

Another valuable law which went through a humming was that to pension school teachers but we failed to find an amendment which provides for the poorly paid, over-worked editors or politicians.

And again we find several bills in which the people are interested, are deemed and one, among the many, is the McCullough insurance bill

which provides, "That an insurance company must pay full value for the face of the premium." This is one of the best laws ever placed on file in the Legislature and should be passed for the people are interested. As it now stands the insurance companies have all the say and pay whatever they feel like and, if you should go to law, you have about as much show of winning as you would have of getting blood out of a turnip. We venture the assertion that there are many people in this county who can speak from past experiences and say, that the insurance companies always got the long end of the deal. We could produce many cases but it would occupy too much space but, to show how it works, we will cite the case of a gentleman who was paying on a \$100 premium and when he was burnt out, received the sum of \$50, the agent claiming the building had depreciated yet, the same agent collected on the \$100 premium always. The gentleman was afraid to go to law for fear of losing the \$50, so you see who puts up the money to pay the high salaried officers. It is claimed by the insurance companies that they could not do business in this State if the McCullough bill is passed. This is only insurance talk, they are trying to hoodwink our lawmakers to be easy on them and let them continue to draw the sap from the insured. If there is any one law that needs amending, it is the insurance law and the McCullough bill is the right one to adjust matters.
