The weather prophets, having been disappointed in their predictions that July would be a hot month because June had been cool, are now trying to prove that it will be known as a summerless year. Comparisons are made with other years when the temperature was below the normal, some of which comparisons hark back as far as the cold summer of 1816, when there was frost and ice in July and the crops were poor and scant. There is no present prospect that the summer of 1902 will go down in meteorological history with any such record. The season has been marked so far more by the evenness than by the lowness of the temperature. The mean temperature of June was 70 degrees, or only two degrees below the average mean temperature of that month for 31 years. The government record shows three Junes during that period with a lower mean temperature and four Junes with the same temperature. In the other years the mean temperature of June ranged from 71 degrees to 75 degrees. There is nothing remarkably cool in that record. The record of July was an average temperature almost exactly normal. What the story of August will be has yet to be told, but it will have to be extraordinarily low in temperature to justify this summer being called a cold one. So far the temperature has been notably equable and the public, which estimates a season from the extreme hot and cold periods, has been misled into the belief that the summer is a cold one. People at the seashore and in the mountains may complain of the season's coolness, but with the great majority who have to remain at home there is nothing the matter with the weather.

Anyway, so long as the weather is just warm enough to obviate the necessity of burning coal for heating, and just cool enough to keep the feet from melting too rapidly, the number of optimists will increase.

Nor will any engine be allowed to stand on any bridge to take water.

Any injury resulting to any bridge where any of the above regulations are violated will be prosecuted before the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's county.

All Supervisors of Road are hereby directed to enforce the above regulations and report any violations of them.

Notice to the Public.

BELOW is published the Local Law relating to Roads and Bridges in Queen Anne's county: (20) "If any person shall alter, change, obstruct or encroach upon any road in Queen Anne's county, or cut down, destroy or injure any bridge, cause, boundary, mark or direction thereon, he shall, on conviction thereof, in the Circuit Court for said county, be fined at the discretion of the Court, not exceeding fifty dollars, to be paid to and accounted for by the Supervisor of the district in which the damage may be done."

The County Commissioners hereby give notice that any person hauling dirt or sand from any public road in said county, or who shall obstruct any drain or ditch draining any road by placing brush or other material or filling the same with dirt will be prosecuted before the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's county.
