They look upon it as a good method of apparently meeting the trust question without touching the tariff that is so precious in their eyes. how the trusts will be seriously disturbed by President Roosevelt's proposed remedy. "Suppose that, after a long and bitter struggle, the Constitution is amended so that national sovereignty over the trusts is established. What then?" asks the Baltimore Sun. "The trusts may still enjoy the privileges assured to them by a high tariff—a tariff which enables them to sell their products at high prices in the home market and to undersell the foreigners in the markets of Europe. This policy, it appears is not condemned by the party now in control of the government, and there is no reason to believe that it will be modified as long as protectionist doctrines prevail. Must the people continue to give a bonus to the trusts for an indefinite period in order that our export trade may be built up at the expense of domestic consumers? Of what material bene fit will national control of the trus s be, if our tariff is of such a nature that the combinations of capital and industry will have an undisputed monopoly of the home market and will be able to charge domestic con sumers such prices as they cho se to exact? The "national control" which President Roosevelt has in mind is a matter of the dim and distant future. What is required is some measure of immediate relief. That could be accomplished through a reduction of the tariff-a reduction which Congress can make at any time without amending the Constitu-

So long as the tariff that protects them and assures them of a monopo y of the home market is not abolished, the trusts will have no occasion for alarm. It will take years to apply the President's remedy of an amendment to the Constitution, and it is not at all certain that such an amendment would be ratified by the Subscriber august, 1992.






