A republican candidate last Saturday night in Baltimore, where coal has been quoted at "20 a ton and none to be had," and where soft coal is so expensive a luxury that only citizens with good bank accounts can look at a coal pile without an ague fit, is trying to persuade his "fellowcitizens" that the trust managers are public benefactors, and that through their wise beneficence a great reform in the cost of living, as well as in the general health, is likely to be effected. His line of augument run thus: We pamper ourselves so much that our physical condition is not what it ought to be. We eat too much, and therefore our stomachs get out of order on the slightest provocation. We keep our houses too warm, and as a consequence a trifling change of temperature sets us all coughing and sneezing and the laundry bill is increased by the imperative demand for more pocket handkerchiefs. He might have pursued his augument farther and shown his "fellow-citizens" that they clothe themselves too warmly and therefore shiver if the winter flannels are left off a day too soon, or a shift of wind to the north finds the overcoat at the other end of the line when it comes time to

go home in an open street car. M. Daniel, of the faculty of sciences of Rennes, has shown, it appears, that grafting is more widely applicable than is commonly supposed. In fact, it is possible, he states, not only to graft a plant on another closely allied to it, but it is "possible to graft together two plants chosen nearly at random, the result depending chiefly on the skill of the operator." Two species of the same family, or even two of widely different families, may be united. Herbaceous plants, too, are as easily grafted as trees. New types can be obtained by grafting distinct plants. Different types of tomatoes, for example-the round yellow, the large red and the red dwarf-may be united, with the result of producing combinations of these types. The large red tomato has been grafted on the eggplant and the latter on the former, with different and useful results. The important principle is established that the stock modifies the character of the plant, or tree, grafted on it. The curious instance is cited of a medlar tree over 100 years old grafted on a hawthorn. The hawthorn has put a branch of medlar that has thorns and produces 12 white flowers where there should be but one. The fruit is medlar, but very small and flat. The question whether the modifications produced by grafting are hereditary is not very clearly answered. Sometimes, it is stated, they appear to be permanent, while at other times they are fugitive. The useful fact brought out by M. Daniel's experiments is that grafting is practicable within much wider limits than are usually supposed to be possible, and produces sometimes useful modifications.

In each case a large limb was broken down from the trunk, but still attached to it. The limbs were propped up and fastened securely with straps, very much as a broken leg might be fastened with splints, and then melted refined wax poured into and over all the cracks. The "surgical operation" was entirey successful. The paraffine prevented the escape of the sap, kept out the rain and moisture which would have rotted the trees, prevented the depre dations of insects, and the limbs seem thus far to be perfectly re-attached to the trees.






