arm or shoulder exercise that will elevate and distend the thorax, such as raising the arms laterally, while that part of an exercise which tends to contract the walls of the chest should be accompanied by exhalation, as lowering the arms laterally from the shoulders or from overhead. When exercise is followed by labored breathing, it is a certain sign that the work has been excessive, and such an extreme is a frequent cause of injury to the heart or lungs. Palpitation or distressful breathing calls for immediate and absolute rest, which is best obtained by lying flat on the back, with arms and legs outstretched.

Exercising is never permitted immediately before or after a meal digestion being considered much more important. During the exercises water, not too cold, may be taken in small sips, but merely rinsing the mouth is recommended. After exercise, the body must return to its normal condition before eating is allowed. Cadets, during exercise, wear soft canvas shoes, uniform trousers and gray flannel shirts, wool next to be skin being considered indispensable. Bathing is ordered in connection with exercise, for no man who merely cleanses the surface of his skin can be expected to possess a clean cutiele. A bath after a good "sweat" accomplishes the flushing of the millions of perspiration ducts in the body. Though a cold bath is now generally preferred for healthy men, it is impossible to lay down an inflexible rule. All depends upon the condition of the individual, and he alone can be the judge. Any bath that leaves the bather in a state of mental depression and physical lossitude must be avoided, as only that bath which leaves one better in mind and body is beneficial. For cleansing the body a warm bath, with plenty of soap, is advised. For stimulation, a cold plunge bath of short duration, taken before the body cools, is best, This latter bath must be followed by a brisk rubbing with a coarse towel, Where neither is possible, a sponge bath with tepld water, followed by brisk rubbing, is the one to use. In this connection, bathing the stomach, by drinking water freely, both at rising and retiring, is strongly recommended to all .- Success.

TESTS OF MENTALITY. Devices For Measuring Intellectual Cap-acity of Children.

While all the rules and devices for physical tests are continually set at ight, says the Chicago Record-Herald, there is much pedagogic value in the results of the investigations made each year by the child study department of the public schools. Neither the mental powers nor the moral perceptions of boys can be gauged by stature or by quickness of muscular movement A tall boy may be short on memory or analytical faculty, while a short boy very frequently astonishes teachers by

his mental penetration or retentiveness of memory. At the same time these investigations serve the useful purpose of establishing certain general principles regarding the relation between physical imperfection and mental deficiency. The results also serve to supply a basis for a more intellectual adaptation of school ap-

a result of physical tests of 317 boys at the John Worthy School, known as the "juvenile bridewell," are particularly instructive and valuable. It was rasuring intellectual capacity through all principal measurements taken to found that these boys are inferior in pupils in the other schools, and that this inferiority increases with age. They are also behind in "motor abil ity," and much lower in memory power than other pupils. As a result of physical measurements

of pupils in all the public schools Mr Smedley draws a number of interesting conclusions regarding the relation between physical condition and mental capacity. He finds that the brighter pupils have greater muscular control than the duller pupils, that memory power is greatest in the larger and stronger pupils, and that the tallesi pupils average as much higher in school efficiency as they do in stature.
