Judge J. D. Campbell, of Philadelphia, who represents the coal railroads in the hearing before the Interstate Commerce Commission, has a poor opinion of people who object to paying excessive prices for fuel. The eminent jurist is convinced that no American citizen is worthy of the respect of a grand and glorious corporation like the Coal Combine unless he regards extortion as a virtue and esteems it a noble privilege to contribute to the prosperity of the mineowners and their allies, the railroads. In a speech in New York on Wednesday he exceriated the advocates of cheap fuel, the ignoble millions who are not happy when the price of coal is kept at a lofty altitude by Judge Campbell's clients. "We will show this commission," he exclaimed with burning eloquence, "that the people of New York for more than a quarter of a century have wrung the bowels out of the coal regions of Pennsylvania, virtually getting their coal for nothing, and then they whine like a pack of whipped dogs when a decent, remunerative price is asked by the miners."

Of course the people will fer ashamed of themselves when they learn, on the authority of Judge Campbell, that their protest against high prices is evidence of a caninspirit; that it is "the dog" in human nature which makes a man anxion. to get the largest possible returns from the money which he spends on the necessaries of life. The Phila-Jeiphia lawyer, who rails so bitte:ly against the misery tendencies of the age, will go down in history as the founder of a new school of economics. According to his theory, consumers have no right to object when the producer fixes prices to suit his notions about "remunerative" profits. It they do not open their purses and unselfishly permit the producer to take what he chooses from their savings, they are guilty of base ingratitude, and their murmurings against extortionate charges are "the whines of a pack of whipped dogs." In fine, the public was made to be kicked and cuffed. Instead of howling when it is lashed it ought to be thankful that it is disciplined and kiss the hand that smite it. This is evidently Judge Campbell's views of the rela tions which should exist between monopolists and the masses.
