

such other voluntary manner as they may think proper, and will be most agreeable to their respective counties, the sums of money as, with any monies already raised, will amount to the following sums in the respective counties, to wit:

And that the Committees of the reſpective counties lay out the ſame in the purchaſe of arms and ammunition for the uſe of ſuch county, to be ſecured and kept in proper and convenient places, under the direction of the ſaid Committees.

**RESOLVED *unanimouſly*,** That it will be neceſſary that a Provincial Meeting of Deputies, choſen by the ſeveral counties of this province, ſhould be held in the city of Annapolis, on Monday, the 24th day of April next, unleſs American grievances be redreſſed before that time; and therefore we recommend that the ſeveral counties of this province chuſe Deputies, as ſoon as conveniently may be, to attend ſuch meeting: And the Committee of Correſpondence for this province are impow'ered to call a meeting of the ſaid Deputies, before the ſaid 24th day of April, if they ſhall eſteem it neceſſary.

**RESOLVED *unanimouſly*,** That contributions from the ſeveral counties of this province, for ſupplying the neceſſities and alleviating the diſtreſſes of our brethren at Boſton, ought to be continued in ſuch manner and ſo long as their occaſions may require; and that it is the duty of the Committees of each county to collect and tranſmit the ſame as ſoon as poſſible.

**RESOLVED *unanimouſly*,** That the Honourable Matthew Tilghman, and John Hall, Samuel Chafe, Thomas Johnson, junior, Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Charles Carroll, barrifter, and William Paca, Eſquires, or any three or more of them, be a committee of correſpondence for this province.

**RESOLVED *unanimouſly*,** That the Honourable Matthew Tilghman, and Thomas Johnson, jun. Robert Goldſborough, William Paca, Samuel Chafe, John Hall, and Thomas Stone, Eſqrs. or any three or more of them, be Delegates to repreſent this Province in the next Continental Congress, and that they, or any three or more of them have full and ample power to conſent and agree to all meaſures which ſuch Congress ſhall deem neceſſary and effectual to obtain a redreſs of American grievances; and this Province bind themſelves to execute, to the utmoſt of their power, all reſolutions which the ſaid Congress may adopt: And further, if the ſaid Congress ſhall think neceſſary to adjourn, we do authoriſe our ſaid Delegates to repreſent and act for this province, in any one Congress to be held by virtue of ſuch adjournment.

**RESOLVED *unanimouſly*,** That it is recommended to the ſeveral Colonies and Provinces, to enter into ſuch or the like reſolutions, for mutual Defence and Protection, as are entered into by this Province.

As our oppoſition to the ſettled plan of the Britiſh adminiſtration to enſlave America, will be ſtrengthened by an union of all ranks of men in this province, we do moſt earneſtly recommend, that all former differences about religion or politics, and all private animoſities and quarrels of every kind, from henceforth ceaſe and be for ever buried in oblivion; and we intreat, we conjure every man, by his duty to God, his country, and his poſterity, cordially to unite in defence of our common rights and liberties.

**ORDERED,** that Copies of theſe reſolutions be tranſmitted by the committee of correſpondence for this province, to the committees of correſpondence for the ſeveral colonies, and be alſo publiſhed in the Maryland Gazette.
