

12 Satisfied of the great friendship between English and Indians  
They Presented a Belt of Peace in testimony of all Indians who  
parts might goe for about their Occasions without any  
and that they signed a firm Peace with them all

13 They Presented a Belt of Peace from their own Proper Nation called  
-chickinawhete Nation not only in relation to a peace for their own Nation, but  
Nations about them with their King whom they looked upon as the representative  
-times of English and Indians of these parts

14 They Presented a Belt of Peace in conclusion for Confirmation & Establishment  
of firm and Staple peace, saying they hoped they might make a fire in any part of  
Land for their necessary uses without Offence

15 They hoped they had by all these Presents reestablished all Peace for their Nation  
& their Indians with their King and all English and Indians of these parts  
that their King would see to it

16 They made a Present of an Indian Boy

We are glad to see you here and you are very well meet to us  
this Country who doe meet you to speak to you  
all of Indians in Virginia and Maryland being all  
We are glad to see you and that speaks

that you have been so mindful of former times  
sent you to us in order to ratifying and performing that Peace  
that you have done and your to make all the English  
and Maryland w<sup>ch</sup> accordingly we shall not be wanting on our parts to keep  
-tained

We take Notice you have in four severall Speeches layd downe a present to  
Each Speech in Testimony of your Sincere desire and willingness to pass by all injur  
red: from the Connois or Pasattawayes and all though their hath been great trouble  
Labour and Pines and a great deal of Blood shed between you all is forgotten by  
you and past by and buried Deep never to be remembered any more

We like it well, and it is a Testimony of your Desire to continue peace and  
Friendship with them and us we shall Acquaint them with it that they be as careful  
to keep of Covenant Chain unspotted on their Parts towards you as you have been  
& have soe freely Declared towards them

We do assure you we shall not but upon your parts  
dislike you, neither have we since we were at amity with you but as our  
& Brethren, killed for doe for of futures

And for your desire that you may pass and repass, and make fire in  
of our Parts as you may have Occasion to travel about your ownfull Occasion  
without such a feare as formerly, we are glad to of Peace formerly made at Albany,  
-ratified and confirm the same

And now we take Notice that you declare your readiness in of  
all your Nations that sent you hither to confirm and renew of Peace for  
with you all for and in of behalf of all English in Virginia and Ma,  
all the Indians under of Protection of our King and  
Doe Declare our hearty Friendship to you as you have be
