in a Lottery Commission which was approved.

Know all men by these presents that the said Samuel Dickinson, William Dickinson and Nicholas Martin are held and firmly bound unto the State of Maryland in the sum of twenty thousand dollars current money to be paid to the said State or its certain Attorney to which payment well and truly to be made and done we bind ourselves our heirs Executors and administrators jointly and severally by these presents sealed with our seals and dated this fifth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine

The condition of the above obligation is such that of the said Samuel S. Dickinson shall well and truly perform and discharge the several duties required of him as a Commissioner of Lotteries, and shall abstain from and avoid all manner of embezzlement to the gain or loss of any Lottery scheme, and shall not be concerned in the purchase of any lottery ticket or tickets, part or parts thereof and shall faithfully pay over all moneys which shall come into his hands as a Commissioner of Lotteries to the person or persons, body or bodies Corporate or private who shall be entitled to receive the same and shall in all respects comply with the existing Laws of this State and of such as may be hereafter enacted in relation to his duties as a Commissioner of Lotteries, then the above obligation to be void and of no effect, otherwise to be and remain in full force & virtue in Law
