

To this residency are allotted Daniel van Slyke, as resident engineer, Herman Boye, as assistant, and James Mears, jun. as rodman.

The third residency will extend from the 19th to the 28th section, inclusive.

To this residency are allotted Willson M. C. Fairfax, resident engineer, William Beckwith, as assistant, R. G. Bowie, as rodman, and Thomas H. Dewitt, a volunteer rodman.

The fourth residency will extend from the 39th to the 64th section inclusive.

To this residency are allotted Erastus Hurd, as resident engineer, Charles B. Fisk, as assistant, and Lanadar G. Davis, as rodman.

The fifth residency will extend from the 65th to the 84th section, inclusive.

To this residency are allotted Alfred Cruger, as resident engineer, Charles E. let, jun. as assistant, William Wallack, as rodman.

Before these arrangements took effect, H. Boye was appointed resident engineer of the fifth residency, and Alfred Cruger ordered to provide for extending the portion of the canal under construction as far above as Williamsport, on either side of the Potomac.

Resolution of the President and Directors of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company: adopted Nov. 22, 1828.

Resolved, That to stimulate the just pride of the contractors on the line of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, a system of rewards, for diligence and fidelity, be instituted and applied, under the direction of the President and Directors, to the following objects:

For the best constructed lock on the first division of the canal, completed within the period stipulated by contract, a silver cup, with suitable devices, of the value of fifty dollars.

For the best constructed culvert of any letting, completed within the contract time, a silver medal, with suitable devices, of the value of ten dollars.
