

That it appears to your Committee, there remains in the Treasury as of 1st December, 1844, the balance of one hundred and eighty-one thousand, two hundred and seventy-two dollars, which they find stands to his credit as Treasurer, in the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, and that it is subject to the following charges to that day, then remaining unpaid, viz :
