To the first enquiry, I reply that I have paid to each and every hand \$1 00 per day, allowing the same for my own, and that I have never employed any by the week, or year. To the second enquiry, I reply that one of the clerks attend to the weighing and marking of all Tobacco, except what I do myself.
