Dear Sir:—In writing you yesterday we omitted to state, that in accordance with the arrangement made with regard to the notes of the Farmers and Merchants Bank, that all the issues should be bought by us when in funds, part to be charged to parties in the West when their funds were in our hands, and when we had not funds of the Western houses the whole to be charged to the Bank. We have been purchasing the issues which you inform us are fraudulent, and on receipt from you of this notice we had \$130 of this circulation, over and above the funds in hand of the Seneca County Bank, which we had purchased with the funds of your Bank. We think it likely we shall receive funds from the Seneca County Bank, when we will charge the notes to them, but should they not remit us we of course expect to retain the amount out of the funds of the Farmers and Merchants Bank. We yesterday advised the parties in Ohio that we should stop purchasing on their account until we were again ordered by them to do so. We send in separate packages and charge to account circulation \$615.00c $\frac{1}{4}$  \$613.46.

Dear Sir:—We have yours 5th. We shall of course honor your check for balance upon the appearance of Naltum. He has not yet called upon us, but if you desire it to relieve your circulation, it appears to us to be rather a poor way of doing so by withdrawing the funds from where most of the notes are presented.

Have to-day received the remittance from Seneca County Bank and shall charge the \$270 on hand stamped by that Bank to them, and as we are instructed by the Seneca Co. Bank and Baillet & Smith, shall continue to purchase for them the circula-
