

RESOLUTIONS assented to.

citizens of this state against the United States, agreeably to the resolve of congress of the 20th of February, 1782, and requesting the approbation of the legislature of the said commissioner for the purpose aforesaid: **RESOLVED**, That the general assembly approve of the appointment of the said Mr. James Nourse, and do direct the intendant of the revenue and the auditor-general, treasurer, and all other officers of this government, to furnish the said commissioner with accounts, vouchers, and all other things necessary to enable him to state and adjust the account of this state with the United States.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council, until some further provision can be made agreeably to the requisition of congress, be authorised and empowered to direct, that provisions and hospital stores be provided for the sick and wounded soldiers, that may be in, or may come to, this state, belonging to the line of said state, or any detached corps; and that the intendant of the revenue be directed to supply such sum or sums of money as may be necessary for that purpose, and charge the same to the United States.

RESOLVED, That the bills of credit of the last emission be received at par with specie, in payment of any bonds given for payment of the said bills of credit or specie, on the purchase of confiscated British property.

WHEREAS William Read, by his humble petition to this general assembly has set forth, that by virtue of a special warrant, and also of a special order from Robert Eden, Esquire, then governor of Maryland, directed to the surveyor of Queen-Anne's county, he had surveyed four hundred and twenty-nine acres of land, called Wright's Square corrected, lying in the reserve of Queen-Anne's county manor, and had returned a certificate for the same, and had also paid the caution money thereon; which said warrant and order were issued, and the said certificate was returned before the late act of assembly respecting reserved lands; and praying that the register of the land-office might be directed to issue a patent on the said certificate: And the facts set forth in the said petition appearing to this house to be true: Therefore, **RESOLVED**, That the register of the land-office do, and he is hereby directed to make out a patent to the said William Read; on the certificate aforesaid, agreeable to the prayer of the said petition.

WHEREAS the claims, which have been set up to the property sold in Nanticoke manor, will cover most of the purchases which were made, and it being unjust to subject the purchasers to execution, until the state is satisfied of their title to the said lands: **RESOLVED**, That no executions be issued against the purchasers of said manor, sold for the redemption of the last emission, before the end of the next session of assembly, unless further order should be taken therein at said session.
