

R E S O L U T I O N S assented to

and at the same time signify to Congress, that nothing shall be wanting on the part of this general assembly, that can render either their temporary or permanent residence in this state convenient and agreeable.

WHEREAS the necessary expences of attending the general assembly have increased at least twenty-five per cent. RESOLVED, That seventeen shillings and six-pence per day be allowed to each member of the general assembly, for his attendance during this session, and the like sum per day for itinerant charges.

RESOLVED, That the auditor-general, or his deputy, shall not hereafter settle, adjust, or liquidate, any continental certificate for money loaned to Congress by any citizen of this state, under or in virtue of the act passed November session 1782, proposing to the citizens of this state, creditors of Congress on loan-office certificates, to accept this state for payment on the terms therein mentioned, until the further order of the general assembly.

RESOLVED, That a public entertainment be provided for his Excellency general Washington, and that the governor be requested to give directions for the same, and that the public defray the expence thereof.

RESOLVED, That the intendant of the revenue be directed to provide money sufficient to discharge what debts may be due on the journal of accounts this session.

WHEREAS it appears to this general assembly, that Martin Adams, late of Frederick county, in obtaining a lease for lives of certain lands on Monocacy manor, from the proprietary agent, by mistake had the name of Henry inserted instead of Andrew: And whereas the supposed life estate in the lands was, by will, afterwards bequeathed to the said Andrew: And whereas the lands have since been sold by the state, and the person in whom the right now is has declared his willingness to relinquish the purchase in favour of the petitioner: RESOLVED, That the commissioners for confiscated property, after due notice, do again set up to public sale the aforesaid lot of ground, distinguished on the present plot by No. 29. for the use of Andrew Adams his life therein, and sell the reversion to the highest bidder on the same terms that the former sale was made, and that the treasurer deliver up any monies, certificates, or securities, which may have been paid in virtue of the former sale.

RESOLVED, That the governor be requested to deliver the chest of books to Robert Smith, late secretary to Sir Robert Eden while governor of Maryland, mentioned in his letter of the 20th instant.

RESOLVED, That the intendant of the revenue do, at the public expence, provide a proper case or cases for the use of the clerk of the house of delegates, to keep the public papers belonging to his office.

RESOLVED, That the intendant be requested to employ workmen to repair the roof of the stadthouse, and to make other such repairs as may be necessary for the preservation of the building; and that he be empowered
