WHEREAS Talbot Shipley, of Anne-Arundel county, hath, in a petition to this general affem-tet forth as follows, to wit: That whereas, by virtue of an act of affembly, paffed at Novemki icilion, seventeen hundred and ninety-one, chapter sitty-three, entitled, An act to lay out certain in Anne-Arundel and Montgomery counties, and also by virtue of another act of affembly, at November session, seventeen hundred and ninety-two, chapter thirty-five, entitled, An act to hablish the road from Baltimore-town towards Frederick-town, by Ellicott's upper mills, as far as Poplar Spring, as a public road, and for other purposes therein mentioned, and also by virtue of wither act of atlembly, passed at November session, seventeen hundred and ninety-two, chapter whiten, entitled, An act to lay open a road to and from the mill of Benjamin Lawrence and Elias Dufey, on the western forks of Patapico falls, the commissioners, by the aforesaid respective acts of appointed for the purpose of laying out the said roads, have marked, bounded and established, the faid public roads over the land of your petitioner, so that your petitioner is now subjected to be inconvenience and expence of maintaining three public roads, in fact, all leading through his Ind, from Baltimore to Frederick-town, whereby his farm is greatly divided and cut to pieces, with great and sensible loss to himself, and without the least advantage to the public; and the said halbot Shipley hath prayed that a law may pais to stop up the old road established by the aforesaid act seventeen hundred and ninety-two, chapter thirty-five, from the place where the new road, opened established by the act of seventeen hundred and ninety-two, chapter eighteen, intersects the old had leading from Baltimore-town to the Poplar Spring, and that the faid old road, or so much of it runs through the land of the faid Talbot Shipley, and the law establishing the same, may be abohed and repealed: And whereas it is doubtful what advantages or disadvantages would result to the public from making any alteration in the aforesaid roads, or either of them, and it appearing proper hat due information ought to be given to the general affembly in order that effectual justice may be undered in the premises; therefore, RESOLVED, That Reuben Merriweather, John Hood and Ribard Dorsey, son of John, be and are hereby appointed commissioners to view the several roads foresaid, and to judge of the propriety or impropriety of stopping up the said road as prayed for by legaid Talbot Shipley, and that the faid commissioners, or any two of them, report their opinion In the subject in writing, under their hands and seals, to the general assembly at their next session; povided, that all costs and charges which may be incurred by the said commissioners in executing heir commission, shall be paid and defrayed by the said Talbot Shipley.

RESOLVED, That the judges of the high court of appeals be and they are hereby authorised and equired, to consider and give their opinion at the ensuing court of appeals, or at the next court therefer, upon the question of law lately referred to the judges of the general court by the chancellor, when adjusting the accounts between the state and the securities of the late Thomas Williams, unker a resolution of November session, seventeen hundred and ninety, and if such opinion shall be in swour of said securities, the chancellor is hereby authorised and requested to make such decree, as under all circumstances he shall think just and equitable; provided, that the original books of Thomas Williams, and the books of the securities, shall be produced to the chancellor; and that the register in chancery be and he is hereby directed to send a copy of the case in appeal to the attorney-general of this state, on or before the first day of March next.

RESOLVED, That Peter Hoffman, Thomas Beatty and Henry Griffith, junior, supervisors appointed by an act, entitled, An act relating to the public roads in Anne-Arundel, Baltimore and lederick counties, be and they are hereby directed and required to lay before the next general assimbly of this state, a sull and sair account of all monies by them received by virtue of the afore- and act, also a sull and sair account of all money by them respectively laid out and expended by virtue of said act, and by whom and for what use the same shall have been paid and expended.

WHEREAS the duties of the council to the governor will be confiderably increased by the act regulate and discipline the militia of this state, and it being reasonable that some compensation would be made for the duties required under the said act; therefore, Resolved, That each member the council be allowed the ensuing year the sum of fifty pounds current money in addition to be salary ascertained by law, and that the same be paid in the manner the law now directs.

WHEREAS the duties of the clerk of the council to the governor will be confiderably increased the appointments under the act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state, and it is just reasonable that some compensation should be given him for his additional trouble, Resolved, hat the clerk of the council shall and he is hereby authorised to charge one shilling and ten-pence also for each commission, and the said see to be paid by the person accepting the same.

WHEREAS it appears to this general assembly, that the commissioners for building a court-house Easton, for the accommodation of the general court on the eastern shore, did not contract with fornelius West for painting the said house, and it being necessary for the preservation of the same, at it should be painted, Resolved, That the commissioners for building a court-house at Easton, Talbot county, for the accommodation of the general court on the eastern shore, be and they are areby authorised to draw on the treasurer of the western shore for the sum of eighty pounds, for a purpose of painting the said court-house, and the said treasurer is hereby empowered and directed pay to the said commissioners, or to the major part of them, or to their orders, the aforesaid sum, at of any money in the treasury, after the payment of the civil list and the journal of accounts of the present session.

RESOLVED, That the thanks of this general affembly be and they are hereby given to Christoher Richmond, agent appointed to settle the accounts of this state with the United States, and to
ke assistant John Wright, for the ability, diligence, and faithful attention to the interests of this
late, with which they have discharged the trusts reposed in them.
