The ballot box was prepared, the ballots deposited therein, and on examination thereof, it appeared that George Plater, Esquire, had a majority of votes, whereupon it is declared in the senate, that the honourable George Plater, Esquire, is duly elected president of the senate.

Mr. Joshua Dorsey was appointed clerk, and qualified by taking the oaths of fidelity and support to this state, the oath of office, and subscribing a declaration of his belief in the christian religion.

William Tuck was appointed messenger, and Edward Roberts door-keeper.
