The speaker, attended by the members of the house of delegates, appeared in the senate, and the following engrossed bills were presented by the speaker to his excellency the governor, who signed and sealed the same in the presence of both houses.

No. 2. An act for the adjournment of Baltimore county court.

No. 3. An act to repeal part of an act, entitled, An act to appropriate certain land to the use of the officers and soldiers of this state, and for the sale of vacant lands.

No. 4. A Supplement to the act for laying out roads from Snell's bridge and Green's bridge on Patuxent, to the bridge over Patapsco falls, near Ellicott's lower mills.

No. 5. An act to compel the attendance of the members of the general assembly.

No. 6. An act to settle and pay the civil list, and other expences of civil government.

No. 7. An act to record a deed from Richard Wiley to William Hunter, late of Baltimore county.

No. 8. A Supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the inspection of salted provisions exported and imported from and to the town of Baltimore.

No. 9. An act respecting the continuance of civil suits in the general and county courts.

No. 10. An act authorising the appointment of trustees to sell and convey a tract of land called Hall's Lot, lying and being in Charles county, for the purposes therein mentioned.

No. 11. An act for the relief of the poor of Kent county.

No. 12. An act for the relief of George Jacob Schly.

No. 13. An act to direct the recording of a deed from John Slater, of Washington county, to Martin Stack of the same county.

No. 14. An act for the relief of William Stewart, of Somerset county.

No. 15. An act for the relief of the securities of John Hayman Nicholls, collector of the tax for Montgomery county.

No. 16. An act for the relief of the poor in Montgomery and Harford counties.

No. 17. An act concerning pardons.

No. 18. An act for the relief of the poor of Cecil county.

No. 19. An act to alter the time of holding Baltimore county court for civil causes.

No. 20. An act to empower the justices of Dorchester county court to lease out the prison lands of said county.

No. 21. A Supplement to the act to enable the securities of Christopher Edelen, deceased, and his administrator, to collect the balances due to him as collector of the taxes, and as sheriff, of Frederick county.

No. 22. A Supplement to the act, entitled, An act for marking and bounding lands.

No. 23. A Supplement to the act for the liquidation and payment of debts against persons convicted of treason.

No. 24. An act to establish a road from the town of Talbot, in Talbot county, to Cow Landing on Third Haven creek, in the county aforesaid.

No. 25. An act giving a more speedy remedy against delinquent subscribers to the Patowmack company.

No. 26. An act to establish pilots, and to regulate their fees.
