THE senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings from Wednesday last to this day were read.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Robertson, of Montgomery, and Robert Amos, junior, of Harford county, was read the second time and will pass.

On motion, ORDERED, That the bill, entitled, An act to regulate auctions in Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, be taken into consideration on Tuesday next.

The bill, entitled, An act for the preservation of the breed of wild deer, and for other purposes therein mentioned, was read the second time and passed with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. Strike out the word "county," in the 2d line of the last page, and insert "Baltimore and Anne-Arundel counties."

Mr. Ott, from the house of delegates, delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to streighten, amend and repair, the public road in Frederick county leading towards Carlisle, in Pennsylvania, endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 27, 1789: Read the first and second time by special order and will pass.

The president lays before the senate a letter from the commissioners of the tax of Prince-George's county to the governor and council; which was read, and, on motion, ORDERED, That Charles Carroll, William Perry and Nicholas Hammond, Esquires, be a committee to consider and report thereon.

The president lays before the senate a letter from the auditor-general, enclosing sundry estimates; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The president lays before the senate a report from Richard Tilghman and Robert Walters, Esquires, appointed by a resolve of the general assembly at their last session to view and inspect the record books and papers in the several public offices in Queen-Anne's county; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Robertson, of Montgomery, and Robert Amos, junior, of Harford county, the bill, entitled, An act for the preservation of the breed of wild deer, and for other purposes therein mentioned, the resolutions respecting William Hendersides and William Philips, the report concerning the records of Queen-Anne's county, and the letter from the auditor-general, enclosing the estimates from the treasury and auditor's office, were sent to the house of delegates by Nicholas Hammond, Esquire.

The resolution respecting Edward Oldham, was read the second time and assented to; and the resolution respecting sundry soldiers, was read the second time and dissented to.

Mr. Matthews, from the house of delegates, delivers to the president a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of certain purchasers of confiscated property, endorsed;

On motion, James Carroll, Esquire, brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to amend and alter sundry parts of an act of assembly, passed at November session, seventeen hundred and eighty-two, entitled, An act for the more effectual paving the streets of Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, and for other purposes therein mentioned; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Sarah Hall, of Baltimore county, was read the second time and passed with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. Strike out from the word "Hall," in the 2d line of the bill, to the end thereof, and insert "the wife of Philip Hall, of Baltimore county, by her petition to this general assembly, hath set forth, that she is now confined in the public gaol of the said county for the fine and fees incurred on a certain indictment for a forcible entry found against her in Baltimore county criminal court, whereof she is convicted, and that she is unable to pay the same: And whereas it appears that the imprisonment of the said Sarah Hall will be injurious to her person, on account of her
