

T U E S D A Y, November 25, 1794.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Richard T. Lowndes, Esquire, who had leave of absence. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The honourable John Eager Howard resigned his station as president pro tempore of the senate.

The honourable William Perry, president, appeared in the senate, and qualified before James Mackubin, Esquire, one of the justices of the peace for Anne-Arundel county, by taking the oath required by the constitution and form of government.

The bill, entitled, An act for building a new prison in Worcester county, the bill, entitled, An act to confirm the proceedings of Caroline county levy court, and to extend the time for the late collector of said county to complete his collections and receive the arrearages due therein, with the amendments to said bills, and the resolution in favour of Samuel Sloan, together with the letter from the president of the council pro tempore, with its enclosures, were all sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers to the clerk of the senate a bill, entitled, An act to withdraw the funds from Washington and Saint-John's colleges, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 18, 1794: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

"By the house of delegates, November 25, 1794: Read the second time and will pass.

Which said bill was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act to empower Micajah Merryman, father and guardian of Sarah Merryman, Moses Merryman, Eleanor Merryman, Mary Merryman and Micajah Merryman, infants, to demise the real estate therein mentioned, was read the second time, and passed with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. In the seventh line of the fourth page, after the word "shall" insert "severally." In the tenth line of the same page, after the word "them" insert "respectively," and after the word "their," in the same line, insert "respective." In the eighth line of the same page, after the word "year" insert "their respective proportions of."

Which said bill, together with its amendments, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

On motion, ORDERED, That the bill, entitled, An act to establish a turnpike road from the City of Washington to Baltimore-town, be committed to William Cooke, James M^cHenry, Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Robert Smith and William Winder, Esquires, to report amendments thereto.

The resolution in favour of John Jones, was read the second time and assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

On motion, William Cooke, Esquire, brings in and delivers a bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act for enlarging the power of the high court of chancery; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of John Brent, Alexander Smith and Sarah Hanson, of the commonwealth of Virginia, was read the second time, and not passed.

Which said bill was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise a lottery for completing a methodist meeting-house at Riefter's-town, in Baltimore county, was read the second time and not passed.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise a lottery for completing a methodist meeting-house at Riefter's-town, in Baltimore county, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

John Campbell, Esquire, from the committee, brings in and delivers a bill, entitled, An act to enable the vestry of Saint-Paul's parish, in Baltimore county, to purchase one or more parcels of ground for the purposes therein mentioned; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, ORDERED, That the bill, entitled, An act to enable William Kilty to sell the personal estate of the children of John Rogers, deceased, his wards, be committed to William Cooke, Charles Goldsborough and Robert Smith, Esquires, to consider and report thereon.

The bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act respecting the continuance of civil suits in the general and county courts, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. At the end of the bill insert the following amendment: "This act to continue and remain in force for three years, and to the end of the next session of the general assembly which shall happen thereafter."

The bill, entitled, An act to alter the time of holding the levy courts in the several counties therein mentioned, was read the second time, and will pass with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. In the 12th line of the first page, strike out the words "third Monday in March," and instead thereof insert "fourth Monday in April."

The bill, entitled, An act to compel the attendance of the members of the general assembly, was read the second time, and will pass with the proposed amendments.
