

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1801.

F R I D A Y, November 6, 1801.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Messrs. John T. Worthington, and John Tyler appeared in the senate, and after taking the oaths required by the constitution and form of government, and subscribing a declaration of their belief in the Christian religion, and taking the oath for the support of the government of the United States, took their seats.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

BY THE SENATE, NOVEMBER 6, 1801.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES,

WE have received your message, and have appointed Mr. Hayward, Mr. Ringgold and Mr. Mackall, a committee on the part of the senate to join the gentlemen by you appointed to compare and examine the engrossed bills.

Mr. Mackall has leave of absence until Monday next.

A memorial from the commissioners of the city of Washington, submitting to the consideration of the legislature, whether it would not be advisable to offer to congress a release of the public property pledged, and other securities given for the payment of the sums loaned to the said commissioners, on congress assigning to the state United States stock, equivalent in value to the stock transferred by the state to the commissioners, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Johnson, Mr. Hayward, Mr. McCulloch and Mr. Ringgold, to consider and report thereon.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Levin Parsons, of Worcester county, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 6, 1801: Read the first and second time "by especial order and will pass.

Which said bills were read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The senate adjourns till to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

S A T U R D A Y, November 7, 1801.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Mackall. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill to settle and ascertain the salary of members of the council for the ensuing year, was read the second time by a special order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The president communicates to the senate a letter from the executive of this state, containing an account of their proceedings since the adjournment of the last legislature; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The senate adjourns till Monday morning 10 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, November 9, 1801.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. Mr. Mackall appeared in the senate. Mr. Henry Hollingsworth appeared in the senate, and after taking the oaths required by the constitution and form of government, and subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian religion, and taking the oath for the support of the government of the United States, took his seat.

The president lays before the senate a letter from John Callahan, register of the land-office for the western shore, enclosing an account of taxes received in his office for one year, ending on the second of October last; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The president lays before the senate a memorial from the trustees of the Frederick Academy, praying that they may be authorized to raise by lottery a sum of money, not exceeding three thousand five hundred dollars, for the use of said academy, and also an account of the present state of said academy; which were read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:
