

During the recess of the legislature, and also relative to a vacancy having taken place in the office of register of wills for Montgomery county by the death of Samuel Turner, Esquire; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

Mr. Robert Bowie appeared in the senate, and after taking the oaths required by the constitution and form of government of this state, and subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian religion, and taking the oath for the support of the government of the United States, took his seat.

The following message was read and agreed to.

By the S E N A T E, June 6, 1809.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

WE have received your message of this morning, proposing to go immediately into the appointment of a register of wills for Montgomery county. We agree to go into this election immediately, and have appointed Mr. Lowrey and Mr. L. Dorsey to join the gentlemen named by you to count the ballots. No one is put in nomination in addition to the person named by you.

W E D N E S D A Y, June 7, 1809.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The message relative to the appointment of a register of wills for Montgomery county, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of David C. Stewart, Lloyd Buchanan and William P. Stewart, of Baltimore county, insolvent debtors, and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Dennis Connell, of Charles county, severally passed by that house June 6, 1809; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Dennis Connell, of Charles county, was read the second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to extend Centre-street in the northern precincts of the city of Baltimore, and to build a bridge therein across Jones Falls, passed by that house June 7, 1809; and the following message:

By the H O U S E of D E L E G A T E S, June 7, 1809.

*Gentlemen of the Senate,*

WE propose to go into the appointment of a senator to represent this state in the senate of the United States during the constitutional period. As there is no mode pointed out by the constitution, or no legislative provision on the subject, by which the appointment is to be conducted, we propose, with the concurrence of your house, a conference, by joint committee of the two houses. Mr. Edmondson, Mr. John Thomas, Mr. Hilleary, Mr. Young and Mr. Herbert, are named by this house to meet such gentlemen as may be named by you to confer on the subject, and report the result of such conference to their respective houses.

Which were severally read the first time and the bill ordered to lie on the table.

The senate proceeded to the election of a person to be recommended to the governor to be commissioned as register of wills for Montgomery county; the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up, and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to meet the committee of the House of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after examining the ballots returned and reported, that Solomon Holland had eighty-four votes. Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Solomon Holland, having had a majority of the votes of all the attending members of both houses, be recommended to the governor to be commissioned as register of wills for Montgomery county.

The further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to extend Centre-street in the northern precincts of the city of Baltimore, and to build a bridge therein across Jones Falls, was read the second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise and empower William Stansbury, and Ellen Kent Stansbury his wife, to demise and lease the piece of ground therein mentioned, passed by that house June 7, 1809; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed with the proposed amendment, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Amendment proposed. At the end of the bill add "reserving and making payable the said yearly rents unto said Ellen Kent Stansbury, her heirs and assigns."

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to confirm the location of the turnpikes therein mentioned, passed by that house June 7, 1809; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.
