

PROCEEDINGS, JUNE SESSION, 1809.

IN SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES, JUNE 6, 1809.

RESOLVED, That the honourable Samuel Smith, a senator appointed by the Executive of the state of Maryland to fill the vacancy which happened in the office of senator for that state, is entitled to hold his seat in the Senate of the United States during the session of the legislature of Maryland, which by the proclamation of the Governor of said state was to commence on the fifth day of the present month of June, unless said legislature fill such vacancy by the appointment of a senator, and this senate be officially informed thereof. Yeas and nays having been required, by one fifth of the senators present, on this resolution, Those who voted in the affirmative are,

Which was read.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

By the S E N A T E, June 10, 1809.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

WE have finished all the business before us, and are ready to close the session immediately. We have appointed Mr. Partridge and Mr. Lloyd Dorsey, to join such gentlemen as shall be named by your house, to wait on the governor, and request his attendance in the senate chamber to sign and seal the laws.

On motion, **RESOLVED**, That the senate proceed immediately to the election of a member to fill the vacancy occasioned by the nonacceptance of John Moores.

The senate proceeded to said election, and after qualifying agreeably to the constitution and form of government, the ballot box being prepared, and the ballots deposited therein, on examination thereof it appeared, that Richard Pindle had eight votes, and Elijah Davis four votes. Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Richard Pindle, having had a majority of votes, is duly elected a member of the senate.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the engrossed bill No. 15, assented to by that house June 9, 1809; which was read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The engrossed bill No. 16 was read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates returns the engrossed bill No. 16, assented to by that house June 10, 1809.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:

By the H O U S E of D E L E G A T E S, June 10, 1809.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be requested to pay unto Edward Lloyd, Esquire, the sum of two thousand dollars, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, to be appropriated under the directions of the governor towards furnishing the government-house, and repairing the same, and the enclosures about buildings thereof.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the engrossed bill No. 17, assented to by that house June 10, 1809, which was read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:

By the H O U S E of D E L E G A T E S, June 10, 1809.

Whereas Thomas King, belonging to the artillery company of the city of Annapolis, and who has been a soldier in the late revolutionary war, and wounded therein, in discharging his duty on this tenth day of June, has been so unfortunate as to lose his right hand by the firing of a cannon, which entitles him to the peculiar bounty of this state, and the said Thomas King having a family dependent on him for support, therefore, **RESOLVED**, That the treasurer of the western shore pay immediately to the said Thomas King, or to his order, the sum of fifty dollars, and a sum equal to the half pay of a sergeant during his life, in quarterly payments, to commence on this day.
