By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, December 7, 1809.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

WE have received your message proposing to proceed at twelve o'clock this day to the election of directors of the different banks therein mentioned, and do concur therewith. No other persons are put in nomination by this house in addition to those mentioned in your message. Mr. Kerr and Mr. Chapman are appointed by this house to join the gentlemen named by the senate to count the ballots and report thereon.

Which was read.

The senate then proceeded to the election, on the part of the state, of two directors in the Union Bank of Maryland, two in the Farmers Bank of Maryland at Annapolis, two in the Branch of said Bank at Easton, two in the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore, and one in the Hagar's-town Bank; the ballot box being prepared, and the ballots deposited therein, the committee appointed by the senate to join the committee appointed by the house of delegates, retired to the conference room, and after sometime returned and reported, that Samuel Wright had forty-nine votes and Thomas Dickson forty-eight votes, as directors in the Union Bank of Maryland; that William Kilty had forty-eight votes, Nicholas Brewer forty-eight votes, Robert Denny two votes, and William Alexander two votes, as directors in the Farmers Bank of Maryland at Annapolis; that David Kerr, jun. had forty-nine votes, John Kennard forty-six votes, and John Hayward two votes, as directors in the Branch Bank at Easton; that Tobias E. Stansbury had forty-eight votes, Peter Little forty-eight votes, Robert Stewart two votes, and Jacob Rogers one vote, as directors in the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore; that Henry Lewis had forty-eight votes, and Upton Lawrence one vote, as director in the Hagar's-town Bank.

Whereupon it appearing, that Samuel Wright, Thomas Dickson, William Kilty, Nicholas Brewer, David Kerr, jun. John Kennard, Tobias E. Stansbury, Peter Little and Henry Lewis, had a majority of the votes of all the attending members of both branches of the legislature, it is declared in the senate, that Samuel Wright and Thomas Dickson in the Union Bank of Maryland, William Kilty and Nicholas Brewer in the Farmers Bank of Maryland at Annapolis, David Kerr, jun. and John Kennard, in the Branch Bank at Easton, Tobias E. Stansbury and Peter Little in the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore, and Henry Lewis in the Hagar's-town Bank, are duly elected directors on the part of the state for and during the term prescribed by law.

The resolutions disapproving of the resolutions of November session, 1808, relative to the embargo, were read the second time and unanimously assented to.
